Observe I.O.D.E. Anniversary

As Monday was the fiftieth anniversary of the founding of the Imperial Order of the Daughters of the Empire, a splendid representation of the Abwegweh Chapter, Summerside, attended divine service in St. Mary's Church on Sunday morning, having paraded from the hall with Mrs. C. H. Stewart, standard bearer.

The Reverend G. R. Harrison welcomed the members and dedicated the new flag. He gave an appropriate sermon from the text, "They pitched by their standards."

He congratulated the Order on what it had accomplished in the past fifty years, especially during the First and Second World Wars when eleven million dollars was spent through the national educational program for the advancement of peace and prosperity in the world.

The movie, a 33-minute documentary produced by the National Film Board and filmed in the Maritimes, tells the story of the co-operative movement which had its birth at Antigonish, N.S.

"The Rising Tide" was produced with the co-operation of New Brunswick, Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island and the extension department of St. Francis-Xavier University at Antigonish, a leader in the study of co-operatives. The people taking part are co-operators around Rustico and Morell in P.-E.I.

Direction and script were handled by Jean Palardy of the Film Board. Cameraman was John Foster; editor Don Peters; producer James Beveridge; and music by Robert Fleming based on themes from songs and ballads of Nova Scotia compiled by Helen Creighton.

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It's the first Canadian film to reach the finals in the annual awards since the Film Board production, "Churchill's Island" won an Oscar in 1941.

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The lone resolution resolved that the siding agreement with the Canadian National Railways dated August 15, 1949 be executed by the Mayor and City Clerk. The motion was moved by Councillor Stewart and seconded by Councillor Cox.

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A great deal of advance planning and organization is necessary to ensure the smooth working of the Disaster Relief Committee of the Red Cross, said the speaker. Each branch must have its local organization which studies the possible disasters and prepares to cope with them should they occur. This means the organization of personnel and taking stock of equipment and supplies which might be available. It also means cooperation with other organizations such as government agencies, police, fire departments, and public health services.

Dr. Doney said that the Red Cross usually specified eleven headings in setting up any relief organization. These are: survey, rescue, medical aid, food, shelter, clothing, transportation, communication, registration and information, public information.

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Dr. Doney concluded by saying that everyone should assist in the work of the Red Cross and take an active part on its committees. A new member, Dr. O. S. Nordland, was introduced to the club by Rotarian Edwin Johnstone. Chairmen yesterday were Rotarians Sterling Giddings and R. H. Rogers.

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
