CHINA PLANS FOR NEW GOVERNMENT

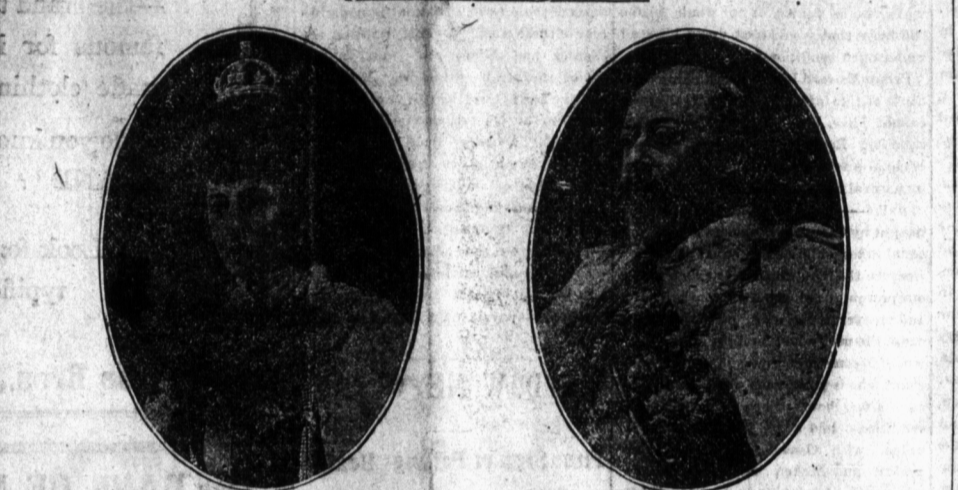
Provinces Prepare For the Proposed New Constitution For the Empire
