Two Are Dead In West Mine Accident

EDMONTON, Nov. 29.—Mine Inspector William Shaw and Hiram Davis are dead, and Manager F. Roberts is not expected to live as a result of gas fumes which overcame them at the Yellow Head mine Monday morning. They were down in the mine, which has been on fire for some time, and in the prosecution of their inspection duties when the accident occurred.

Catch Of Sea Fish For October

OTTAWA, Nov. 29.—Despite unfavourable weather conditions which prevailed on the Atlantic coast during October, landings of sea fish in Canada during the month, was 679,697 cwts., as compared with 490,206 cwts. in October of last year. The value of the catch to the fishermen last month was \$1,493,365 as against \$1,467,324 in October, 1921.

The total catch of cod, haddock, hake and pollock during the month was 1,034,348 cwts., as compared with 1,273,939 the corresponding month of last year. Pollock was the only one of these varieties which showed a falling off in the catch.

Mackerel taken amounted to 20,051 cwts., as against 15,429 cwts., in October 1921. The total Mackerel catch for the year is 240,331 cwts. as against 141,955 cwts. last year. The lobster catch during the month was 4,298 cwts., a slight decrease from the landings of October last year. The total catch since the opening of the season in November last is 349,515 cwts., of which 23,955 have been used fresh, and the remainder canned, making 142,296 cases. Figures for the corresponding period in the preceding year were 338,172 cwts., caught 87,854 cwts. used fresh, and 125,611 cases canned.

Smelt and oyster seasons opened during the month. There were 2,346 cwts. of the former, and 10,630 blbs. of the latter taken. These quantities are slightly less than for October, 1921.

Trial And Death Of Greek Ministers

(Special to The Guardian.)
ATHENS, Nov. 29.—A statement issued by the court martial which condemned to death the former ministers, giving the reason for imposing the sentences of death says in effect that the defendants knowingly concealed from the people the danger involved in King Constantine's return to the throne, and that although Greece was breaking away from her alliances, they did their utmost to consolidate Constantine in order to enjoy office under him.

"By terrorist methods," the statement adds, "they stifled all public opinion contrary to them, arranged with General Hadjajanis a pretended offensive against Constantinople and thereby brought about the enemy's offensive and collapse of the Greek front in Asia Minor, thus liberally delivering a large part of the army into the enemy's hands. They therefore were convicted in accordance with several articles of the military and penal codes of conspiring to commit high treason."

The trial of several former Greek ministers and military officials, who were charged with high treason as the result of the army's recent defeat by the Turks began Nov. 13. The court martial was instituted by a decree of the revolutionary committee after an investigation had resulted in a report charging treason.

Former King Constantine was declared guilty on the charges on the ground that he was not responsible for acts that led to the triumph of the Turkish armies. It was decided that his ministers must bear the full responsibility.

The accused men were permitted to testify in their own behalf. Early in the trial the British government made representations against possible imposition of the death sentences. Despatches from London said that the British action had been generally resented in Athens, and that the fall of the Zaimis ministry a few days ago could be traced directly to the British stand.

The last day of the trial attracted a large assemblage, including many women high in society drawn to the court room from the double motive of learning what would be the fate of the eight accused ministers and the nature of the sentence to be imposed, upon which depended Greece's relations with Great Britain.

Many Prisoners Seek Release

BOSTON, Nov. 29.—More than 60 prisoners in the penal institutions of the state, all hopeful of being released in order that they may enjoy Thanksgiving or Christmas at home with their families, have filed applications for pardon and hearings on several of them are to be conducted by the pardon committee of the executive council at its regular meeting next Wednesday.

In years gone by it was the practice at the meeting of the day preceding Thanksgiving to pardon an officer of the collection man usually being made on the recommendation of the warden of the state prison.

Only a few years ago, however, this practice was abandoned, and in its place has grown up a custom of paroling a considerable number of persons serving short sentences, with selections made from each of the institutions of the state. This practice has led to the filing of applications this year not only from the state prison but also from the state farm, the Concord reformatory, and the reformatory for women.

Prisoners seeking release send their applications to the governor who forwards them to the state parole board; that tribunal obtains the complete record of each applicant, which is immediately sent back to the governor. After considering these records, he determines upon those cases which he deems most meritorious, and returns the papers to the parole board for a recommendation as to whether the applicant should be released.

For several weeks past the parole board has been conducting hearings and otherwise investigating the applicants for release this year, and those which they have favored will come before the pardon committee of the council next week for action. Occasionally the pardon committee turns down a recommendation of the parole board in the main its conclusions are adopted, and if such proves to be the case this year, a considerable number of the 60 applicants will be released next Wednesday night.

Dail Eireann Upholds Death Of E. Childers

DUBLIN, Nov. 29.—During the session of the Dail Eireann today, when the financial estimates were under consideration, the execution of Erskine Childers and the treatment of Mary MacSwiney while she was in Mount Joy prison on a hunger strike came up. The execution of Childers was brought forward by George Gavin Duffy, former minister of foreign affairs, and the treatment of MacSwiney by Cathal O'Shanon, Laborite. The action of the government in both cases was strongly upheld respectively by William O'Grave, president of the Dail, and Kevin O'Higgins, the home minister.

Mr. Duffy during the debate asked Richard Mulcahy minister of defense, to explain the execution of Childers. Duffy said Childers was a great Irishman, not merely in law, but in fact. Continuing, Mr. Duffy said Childers had consecrated his life to independence for Ireland; he was perfectly sincere, brilliant of intellect and was extraordinarily modest; he had actually been elected by the Irish government as Irish ambassador to the United States.

Mr. Gosgrave in an impassioned reply said Duffy was afraid of his own shadow; that he made his speech to tell the people outside that he was not guilty, like the others.

The members of the Dail, Mr. O'Grave continued, were dealing with the situation in which the plan of assassination was in the minds of the people opposed to the government, and their newspapers reeked with incitement to their dupes to commit these assassinations.

Air Pilots Drop Into Lough Neagh

LONDON, Nov. 29.—Through trying to land when they lost their way in a fog while flying to Dublin from Alderbury, County Antrim, Wing-Commander Bettington and Flying Officer Craik, of the Royal Air force, came down in Lough Neagh, Ulster.

The Aeroplane sank almost immediately, and Flying Officer Craik the pilot who was strapped in had a desperate struggle to free himself and was completely exhausted when he regained the surface.

The two men clung to some wreckage for an hour, until rescued by fishermen.

Wing-Commander Bettington fractured his jaw and injured his legs and thigh.
