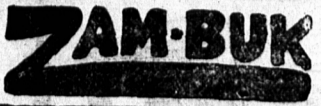

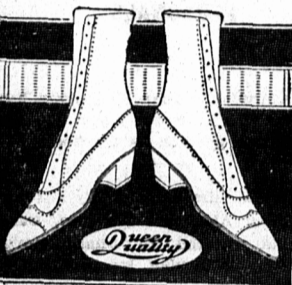

WAITING SAFE CONDUCT

AMSTERDAM, Aug. 31—While a Moscow despatch to the Rhenish Westphalian Gazette of Essen, states that the Entente diplomatic representatives there have been liberated, latest advices from the Bolshevik capital, under date of August 26, deny that the American and British diplomats were ever arrested. The despatch to the Rhenish Westphalian Gazette, however, says that members of the Allied military missions at Moscow are still in custody. Dewitt C. Poole, the acting American consul general at Moscow, despatches state, is awaiting a safe conduct from the German government and the conclusion of an arrangement between Russia and the Entente governments for a reciprocal return of diplomatic and consular officers before departing.

SEDITION CHARGED AGAINST A BOSTON CLERGYMAN

BOSTON, August 31—Charged with violating the Espionage Act by making seditious remarks from the pulpit and in private conversation, Rev. John Steik, a Lutheran clergyman, known throughout New England, was arrested here today. The Minister is alleged to have said from his pulpit that the explosion at Halifax was "an act of God against the enemies of Germany", and to have entered into a personal attack on Marshal Joffre during the latter's visit in this city. In private conversation Mr. Steik is alleged to have advised young men contemplating enlisting to enter the German army and to have offered to help drafted men to escape military service. He is alleged to have said that the soldiers of the United States would be "like children when they encounter the Germans." The clergyman, who is 53 years of age, was born in Russia
