POSTAL TELEGRAPHS.

The people of Prince Edward Island, owing to their grave disabilities in regard to the telegraph service are naturally deeply interested in the prospect of the Government of Canada undertaking the working of all the telegraph systems. And every new move in that direction or tending to bring about that desirable end is a matter of some public concern to our people. Just now the Ottawa Board of Trade has taken up the matter of Government telegraphy in a broad and imperial spirit. A circular letter has been framed and sent out to the Boards of Trade and Chambers of Commerce throughout the British Isles and Colonies urging the importance of state-owned cables and land lines to make a complete circuit of the British world.

The present status of the telegraph service in the British possessions is that the central and provincial Governments mainly own and operate the telegraph systems. In the British Isles the Government own and operate the telegraph as a part of the postal service. In South Africa, India, the Commonwealth of Australia and in New Zealand the like system prevails. Canada stands as an exception to the rule, having followed the American plan of company service, but with a measure of reserve. Some twenty or more years ago when the general telegraph Act was passed, power was taken for the Government to acquire all the telegraph lines at a valuation. Moreover the Government has felt obligated to construct and operate its own telegraphs in cases where the companies failed to supply the needed service. The Government constructed lines connecting various smaller islands with the mainland; they built lines in the Northwest in advance of the companies, and more recently they built the long line to Dawson City, which the companies would not undertake.

More recently the Government of Canada, conjointly with the Governments of Britain and Australia have undertaken the construction of a cable from British Columbia to Australia, Canada to pay five-eighths of the cost. The proposal of the Ottawa Board of Trade is in its general scope that a system of state-owned cables shall also connect Britain with Canada, across the Atlantic; Australia with South Africa, and South Africa by way of St. Helena and Ascension with the West Indies. To complete the ambitious system the land lines of Canada must be taken over by the Government, and the Empire will then have a world-girdling system of telegraphs of the greatest value and importance both in a commercial and military sense. It will take some time, doubtless, to carry out a plan so extensive and costly, but we have reason to believe that the Government of Canada are seriously contemplating the acquisition of the land lines in Canada. We trust that the imperial scheme may yet be carried out in its entirety and that everything possible may be done to hasten its completion. We would be glad to find our Board of Trade giving expression to the feelings and wishes of our own community in the matter, and by so much adding to the impetus of a movement in which no other section of the Empire stands to gain more largely than ourselves.

The Montreal Witness in its issue of 5th June printed the full text of the Island Prohibitory Law. The Witness says of it: "One satisfactory thing is proved, that Prince Edward Island wants prohibition."

In the celebrated libel suit of Mrs. Woodbury against Mrs Eddy the plaintiff failed to make a case to the satisfaction of the Court and the head of the Christian Scientists won a legal victory for the time. An appeal is talked of.

The time for receiving tenders for the City lighting expired on Wednesday of last week, and it is understood that only two tenders were received, being respectively those of the Full Company and of the present contractor. Report has it on what authority we do not know, that if the lower tender is accepted the contract must change hands. Be that as may be the large majority of citizens would welcome almost any change from the sort of lighting service which has been too long tolerated in Charlottetown.

According to the Montreal Witness a strange action has been taken by the Parent Government in regard to the liquor trade in that Province. Hitherto the municipal councils have had power, by refusing to grant licenses, to render the liquor trade illegal within their jurisdiction, and in this way the traffic had been placed under ban throughout two thirds of the Province. Now the Government of Quebec have sent out circulars to the license inspectors to grant wholesale and bottler's licenses to whoever tenders the fee. Under these licenses the bottler's cart can go from house to house and sell where now the municipal council has refused a license "The course of the Government," says the Witness "is due to a sordid desire to mend the decrepitate finances of the Province by exploiting its vices."
