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Thousands of Tons In Fall Of Rock At Niagara

NIAGARA FALLS, N. Y., Jan. 18.—Thousands of tons of rock at the crest of Niagara Falls, between the American shore and Luna Island, gave way today and crashed into the chasm. Rapid erosion continued for several hours, beginning at a-

bout midnight and continuing until 6 a. m. reservation officials said. The new pile of rock at the foot of the Falls was estimated to be between eighty and one hundred feet high. The fall of rock is the largest that has occurred since white men knew the great cataract.

NO CHARGE LAID FOR THEFT OF FOX PELT

Spring Valley Man Arrested For Fox Stealing Is Released On Bond For Good Behavior.

SUMMERSIDE, Jan. 17.—On Saturday a young man from Spring Valley took a fox pelt from the office of a prominent business man of Summerside during his temporary absence. He sold the pelt to a nearby fur buyer immediately after he had taken it. The cheque was made out in the name of a prominent citizen near the residence of the young man instead of the accused's own name. The cheque was endorsed by the accused in the name of the payee and presented at a local bank and he received payment. The owner of the pelt, missing it on his return, went to the buyer in question and immediately identified the pelt sold by the young man to the buyer. Chief of Police Kane arrested the man and held him in custody. After some negotiations had taken place between the Attorney General and the accused's father, he was released by Chief of Police Kane on the orders of the Attorney General on his father giving bonds for \$2,000 for his good behaviour for three years.

OTTAWA, Jan. 17.—Mr. Justice Duff, of the Supreme Court of Canada, tonight became Administrator of the Dominion, pending the appointment of a new Governor General.

MOUNTED BRING TRAGIC TALE OUT OF NORTH

EDMONTON, Alta., Jan. 18.—Tales of starvation and tragedy came out of the north in the annual reports from Royal Canadian Mounted Police detachments to "B" division headquarters in Edmonton. They tell of the starving to death of a young American, who attempted to brave a 300 mile winter trip with only two weeks supplies of rations; the accidental shooting of a baby as it slept in a bed and the drowning of a trapper in a lake. The young American was James Eldon Michael, 25; of Albany, California. He left Hay Lake on foot on March 17, 1930, and his body was found in an isolated trapper's cabin on December 12, 1930. Tragic notes left indicated that he had starved to death. James Higlak, a few months old baby, was killed on November 7, 1929, when William Storr, prospector, accidentally discharged his rifle. An overturned 14 foot canoe frozen in the ice at Fish Lake, 32 miles north of Fort Wrigley, indicated that W. E. Butler, trapper, had died by drowning during the fall.

Violent Storm Passes Over Great Britain

LONDON, Jan. 17.—A violent storm which raged over Great Britain during the night abated today. The gale ripped open the roof of the Clay-Donovon chemical factory, spilling 100 tons of sulphuric acid. Employees hurriedly neutralized the acid, preventing what would undoubtedly have been serious consequences as it spread through the neighborhood. Three persons were killed by falling chimneys and signs. Many signs were torn from their hangings, but absence of pedestrians at the early hour kept the casualty list down. The Canadian Pacific Liner Duchess of York was pinned to her dock at Liverpool by the force of the wind and had to delay her sailing. Tugs tried vainly to get her into midstream.

MAKES APPEAL TO GANDHI

NEW DELHI, India, Jan. 18.—(Canadian Press Cable via Reuters.) An appeal to Mahatma Gandhi to try another course, and to Indian opinion generally to join with Great Britain in making the very best out of the deliberations of the London Round Table Conference, was made by Lord Irwin, Viceroy of India, at the opening of the new Legislative Assembly here yesterday. Lord Irwin coupled this plea for the future of India, with a stern condemnation of the activities of that class in India, which is violently opposed to British cooperation. The experiences of the past few months, the Viceroy said, leave no doubt in regard to the existence of an organization, whose insane objective is to promote the overthrow of the established government by the deliberate creation of a state of terrorism.

Maharajah Will Give Banquet

LONDON, Jan. 17.—The Maharajah of Alwar, wife of one of the Princely delegates to the Indian Round Table Conference, will dine Monday night with 300 guests her husband has invited to a farewell banquet, but none of the guests will see her. She is to sit behind a screen and she will receive her dishes from the hands of her own serving woman. All this because the Maharajah enjoins strict "Purdah" upon the women of his household. He is the only one who ever sees their faces. This will be one of the most colorful functions of the many which have attended the Indian Conference.

S' Side Resident Passes Away

SUMMERSIDE, Jan. 18.—Summerside was shocked on Sunday to learn of the death Saturday night of Mr. W. K. MacGougan, a prominent citizen and fox man. Although Mr. MacGougan has been ill for some months, his death came as a great shock to his family and friends. The late Mr. MacGougan was 65 years of age and was born at Malpeque, the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Duncan MacGougan, one of the oldest families of the district. The deceased has been a resident of Summerside for many years and was held in the highest esteem by all classes of citizens. Before going into the fox business he was a prominent business man. Since the start of the silver fox industry he has been associated with the fur trade and had one of the finest fox ranches on the Island. He was keenly interested in the growth of the industry and did much to promote the breeding of the higher grade of foxes. He leaves to mourn his widow, formerly Miss Ida Melrose, of Guelph, Ont., and three sons, Keith, who is attending McGill University, Harry and James at home; also four brothers and three sisters, namely, Charles, of Spokane; Mrs. John T. MacKay, of Seaview; Mrs. Crosswell, of Troy; Sinclair, of Malpeque and George, Owen and Miss Flora on the old homestead at Malpeque, to all of whom the Guardian extends sincere sympathy.

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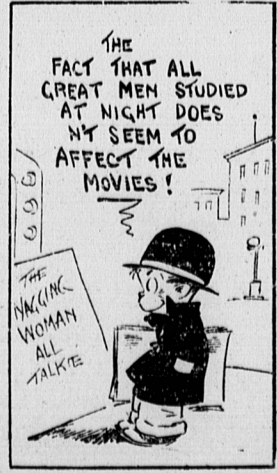
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Hot-Tempered Shields Is Suspended
