DOROTHY DIX SAYS—

Childless Couple

Wife Foolish in Thinking Her Marriage Is Ruined

DEAR DOROTHY DIX: More than one doctor has told me that I can never have any children. My husband loves children dearly and before our marriage I can remember him saying how proud he would be when we had our own family, so I feel that I am cheating him out of part of his happiness in life by not giving him any children.

I have told him to leave me, but he refuses to even listen to me because he loves me so much. But I am wondering how it will be in the future years to come. We are both very young and should have the best years of our lives ahead of us, but will they be ruined for him because our home is childless?

Of course, we can adopt a child. But I feel that I should leave him and let him have the real happiness of being the father he deserves to be. I am desperate for some good, sound advice. Will you give me your opinion?

ANSWER: Inasmuch as the stability of your marriage and your future happiness depend upon your attitude toward the child problem, the decision of what to do lies absolutely with you and your husband, and no outsider has the right to interfere in it.

PARENTAL INSTINCT VARIES

And the husband pals up with his wife, as he cannot do if she is tied down with babies and cannot step out with him in an evening.

You are very foolish in thinking that you will ruin your husband's whole life because you cannot give him children. He will be disappointed at first. But he will accept it as one of the digs of fate that we all get, and it will become just one of those things, unless you keep rubbing it in by going into a state of melancholy, as you seem inclined to do.

Also, you are making a great mistake in not taking a child for adoption and thinking that your husband will not love the youngster because he is not his own offspring. My observation is that the parents of adopted children are crazier about them than the actual fathers and mothers are, of their own flesh and blood.

VISIT TO SICK OFTEN HARMFUL

But why not write him a note, call him on the telephone, or send him a "book instead"? Wait until he is home again to "do your duty." That would be doing him a real favour.

The head of a large midwestern hospital recently called hospital visitors "hazards" because they bring the community right into the bedroom.

So why don't we do away with the out-moded social custom that says we must call on the sick, especially those who are ill enough to be hospitalized. Your "duty call" doesn't do the patient any good in most cases, and it may do him a lot of harm.

GALL STONES MAY NOT BE HARMLESS

Because the majority of men and women with gall stones do not know the stones are present, and also so many with stones have but "slight" symptoms, most physicians naturally advise all these patients that no treatment is necessary. Should attacks of gall stone colic occur, or there be persistent pain in the region of the gall bladder, then draining the gall bladder or removing the gall bladder by surgical operation is usually advised. It will come as a surprise to many to be told that gall stones are common with advancing years, such as heart and blood vessel diseases, which may cause death.

For years, many have thought of a single gall stone as harmless. But Dr. Bachhuber points out that it is the single stone that most often perforates the gall bladder, thus setting up that deadly complication, peritonitis, which means an immediate operation to save the life of the person.

Another danger of gall stones is that the patient, because he recovers from several attacks of gall stone colic, thinks he will always do so. This is a mistake because he may not survive the next attack.

Finally, as cancer of the gall bladder is always fatal and 60 per cent of these cases have gall stones, the removal of gall stones early would save life.

I am handing on this information as so many with slight gall stone symptoms feel that they have nothing to worry about and fail to consult their physician. Early treatment will save many lives.

Dr. C. A. Bachhuber, Professor of Surgery, College of Medical Evangelists, states that there are certain facts about gall stones that all should recognize. First, there are no harmless gall stones. Gall stones—where there are many or only one—will sooner or later cause serious symptoms which may or may not be relieved by surgery. Second, as the patient grows older, he usually becomes the alluring, subtle and glamorous.

Q. Should the hostess plan some entertainment for each day of a house party?
A. Yes; to make the house party a success this should be done. However, some free time should be left for the guests to do as they please usually the mornings.

Q. When two women are driving, who enters the automobile first—the hostess or her guest?
A. The guest.

Q. Is it customary to tip the coat-room attendant of a dining room?
A. Yes; the usual amount is ten cents more if desired.

Q. How can I make dishes of food look more attractive?
A. Colors make food attractive to the eye. An ordinary dish can be made to look more appetizing by garnishing with fancy slices of pimento, watercress, parsley, or green peppers.

Q. How can I remove bluing stains from linen?
A. It can be removed very readily with a little wood alcohol.

Q. How can I mend broken chinaware?
A. Use a cement made by mixing plaster of Paris with the white of an egg to the consistency of cream.

Sugarless BUT Sweet

MAGIC Honey Pound Cake

1 1/2 c. seedless raisins 2 1/4 tsp. Magic Baking Powder
1/2 c. shortening 1/4 tsp. salt
1/2 c. honey 1/4 tsp. vanilla extract
3 eggs, well beaten 1/4 tsp. lemon extract
2 1/4 c. sifted all-purpose flour

Rinse raisins; drain; dry on towel—cut fine with scissors. Work shortening with spoon until fluffy and creamy; gradually add honey, while continuing to work with a spoon. Add beaten eggs, and blend. Gradually stir in sifted dry ingredients; beat with spoon until smooth. Add extracts, raisins; stir to blend. Bake in greased, lightly floured 9" x 9" x 3" pan at 300°F. for 2 hours.
