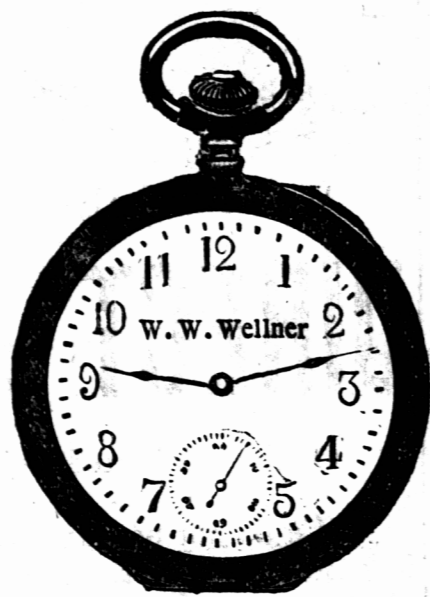

ALL NEWS OF LOCAL INTEREST

A VERY interesting ceremony took place in the Dufferin hotel Tuesday at 1 o'clock when F. G. Spencer, St John and well known as concert manager in Charlottetown was presented with a morocco pocketbook, suitably inscribed, and a pair of silver mounted hair brushes by the members of the Scottish concert party who have just concluded their tour in these parts under his direction. Mackenzie Murdoch made the presentation and in a few neat sentences conveyed the gratitude of the company for the kindness and consideration extended to the strangers in a strange land by Mr. Spencer, asking him to accept the token not for its intrinsic value but for the deep feelings of gratitude which prompted them. Mr. Spencer, in replying, said that he felt he was losing the company of friends and that he didn't need any token to remember his Scotch artists this season, but that he would keep and value them for all time. Mr. Neil endorsed Mackenzie Murdoch's remarks, and the company adjourned to dinner. The company left Tuesday evening for Montreal.

EASTERN NOTES.—The new Baptist Church was opened on Sunday the 6th inst. The day was fine though the season of the year was an uncertain one for a large attendance. Rev. Mr. Gardner the pastor was assisted by Rev. J. C. Spurr, who preached the dedication sermon, and Deacon Alex Scott, offered the dedicatory prayer. Rev. McDonald has been paying his Red Point friends a visit. He was the guest of Ronald McLellan.—T. S. Robertson spent the 11th ploughing. Compare that with your western snow banks.

The second annual meeting of the Commercial Cross Farmers' Institute was held in the Orange Hall at Commercial Cross on Thursday Nov. 26th. The President, Samuel Martin was in the chair and opened the meeting. The minutes of the former meeting were read and approved. The President's report showed the Institute to have been a decided success during the last year. He urged the members to hold as their watchword, "good seeds, improved stock, and highest market prices for farm produce" and impressed upon his fellow-members the necessity of increasing the membership of the Institute so that all or nearly all the farmers in the Institute district might share the benefits of union and co-operation. The report of the Treasurer showed the Institute to be on a firm financial basis, while that from the Secretary told of a considerable increase in the membership during that year. The Institute have secured several cattle of improved breed, have purchased most of their own farm seeds, procuring the best quality obtainable, and during the shipping season have sent four different cargoes of farm produce to the Sydney markets. At the annual meeting of the Farmers' Institute of Lots 23 and 24, held in Mayfield Hall Tuesday evening, Wm. Laird of New Glasgow delivered an address on Agriculture. The speaker traced the farming profession back to the garden of Eden and showed the wonderful developments that have been made as time rolled on. Farming is the most ancient, most beautiful, most useful and most noble of all occupations. It is the largest industry in the world, in Canada 1/3 of her population being engaged in it. The "art of arts" by it we live, by it the world has been civilized, for by it man has been reclaimed from savagery and the world from a wilderness. The lecturer was delivered in Mr. Laird's usual forcible manner and was intensely interesting, highly instructive and was heartily applauded. After the reports were disposed of which showed the funds principally invested in pure bred stock, (now the property of the Institute,) the following officers were then elected for the ensuing year viz: Wm. Laird, President, re-elected; W. G. Houston, Vice President; John Houston, Treasurer; A. Moffat, Secretary and Pierce McNeill, Auditor. Directors Joseph Robertson, Mayfield; George R. McNeill, Cavendish; Thomas Doyle, North Rustico; Ernest Bullman, South Rustico; and Nelson Orr, New Glasgow. At the next meeting on Monday evening the (23rd) inst. Lemuel Clarke of South Rustico will deliver an address. Topic, "General Information."

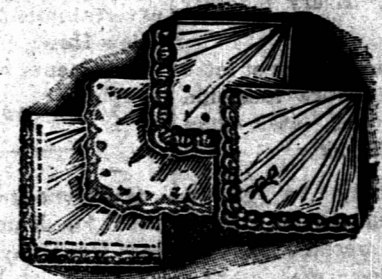
