

NEW BRUNSWICK ELECTIONS THE GOVERNMENT SUSTAINED

New House Will Stand 36 Government to 10 Opposition—All Members of the Government Elected—Premier Tweedy Has Narrow Majority in Northumberland—Close Contest in Saint John—Opposition After Some Losses Have Net Gain of Four—

St. JOHN, March 1—(Special)—The Tweedie Government was sustained by a large majority in Saturday's elections, the Opposition securing only eight or nine seats.

Elections took place in every County but Gloucester where Monday is Election day.

THE PREMIER'S COUNTY DIVIDED.

Returns still incomplete from Northumberland County indicate that Tweedie and Burchill (Government), and Morrissey and Loggie (Opposition), are elected. The contest is close between Loggie and O'Brien, Government, with chances in favor of the former.

SOME GOVERNMENT VICTORIES.

The Government carried Restigouche, two members, with six hundred majority; Kent, three members; Westmoreland, four members, with five hundred majority; Albert, two members; St. John City and County, six members; Kings, three members; Queen's, two members; Victoria, two members and Madawaska, two members, and get two in Northumberland and one in Carleton.

THE OPPOSITION LIST.

The Opposition carry Sunbury, two members and Charlotte four members and elect two in Carleton and one, perhaps two, in Northumberland.

HOW PARTIES WILL STAND.

The Government is sure to carry Gloucester, so the next House will stand 10 Opposition to 36 Government.

This is a gain of four seats for the Opposition, which had only six members in the last House.

CLOSE CONTEST IN ST. JOHN.

In St. John City the contest was very close, Lantalam, the lowest member on the Government ticket beating Wilson, the highest on the Opposition ticket by only 12 votes.

OPPOSITION LOSSES AND GAINS.

The Opposition lost one man in Madawaska, one in St. John, one in Restigouche, two in Westmoreland and gained two in Northumberland, one in Carleton and four in Charlotte.

IMMENSE BLAZE IN HALIFAX

The Most Disastrous Occurring for Many Years

ESTIMATED LOSS \$150,090

Moir's Bakery Burned and Four Hundred People are out of Employment.

HALIFAX, March 1—(Special)—The most disastrous fire that has taken place here for years occurred on Saturday night in the midst of a terrific wind and rain storm. It started in Moir's large bakery which was soon destroyed.

Seanlan's dry goods store on Duke Street was also burned with all the contents.

The City Hall took fire several times but escaped.

Several other buildings were more or less damaged by the flames.

The total loss is estimated at a hundred and fifty thousand dollars. Moir's loss will be about eighty thousand.

Four hundred people are out of employment as a result of the burning of the Moir establishment.
