NEW YORK, Sept. 30.—Lady Patricia Russell, who ran away from home as a girl of 17 to become a maid in an English country house so that she might study character and acquire a cockney accent for stage work, is in New York to appear before the footlights, under the name of Pamela Dartrey. Lady Russell is a grand daughter of the late Marquis of Dufferin, once Governor-General of Canada.

MCKENNA WINS ON A TECHNICAL K. O.

Stevie McDonald And Johnny McIntyre Box To A Draw. Donovan Wins Preliminary. Large Crowd Witness Both Bouts. Morris Mc Donald No Match For McKenna.

The boxing attractions at the Arena last evening were a big drawing card and long before the bouts started all the ringside seats and along the sides and balconies were filled to capacity.

The main bout of the evening was the ten round middleweight bout between Jack McKenna and Morris McDonald, which was won in technical knockout. McDonald throwing up the sponge after McKenna had floored him for the count of nine.

Both boxers were fit, weighing in at 155 pounds. McKenna and McDonald from the start was the aggressor, both fighters fought close in and many clinches was the result. In the sixth and fatal round for McDonald, McKenna at the open-jaw slipped one to the head that McKenna followed in quick succession by two to the body the last putting McDonald to the canvas for the count of nine, on coming to his feet he was groggy and dazed and McKenna had no difficulty in hammering at will.

McKenna is a swift, hard-hitting boxer, active and clever and at no time during the six rounds was he in trouble. McDonald no doubt is a good boxer, but was not in it with McKenna we can say for McDonald a bear for punishment, as he took a lot of it, and was what could be called a "tired" fighter.

In the eighth round semi-final between Steve McDonald and Johnny Alex McIntyre, it could possibly be considered tame along side of the main bout, but the two boys clearly demonstrated their ability to punch and keep clear of punches. Both boys will be heard from yet in their weight.

Both boxers showed to be about even, with McDonald, slightly the aggressor and displaying some clever foot work that kept Mr. McIntyre guessing all the time, although both mixed it lively at times they were apparently fresh at the finish, and it was declared a draw. In the preliminary bout, three rounds between Alf Donovan and W. Carr, Donovan getting the decision at the end of the fight.

McKenna opened with a drive to the body and as they danced around the ring McKenna again lands a right and left to body, and they clinch, they part and McKenna drives both to face, they meet close in and exchange lefts and rights to body and chin, and they clinch. McDonald leads with a right and left to body and they clinch, they spar around for an opening and McKenna leads a hard right to body, the bell caught them swapping rights and lefts in the centre of the ring.

ROUND TWO Open with McDonald driving a right to the ribs, McKenna counters with a right and left to head. McDonald put in left to body and right to head, McKenna drives a wicked right to face, followed by a right and left to head and body, clinch, both spring around the ring and McDonald catches McKenna in the chin with a right, and they clinch. McKenna drives a right and left to face and they clinch. McKenna lands two hard rights to body and they clinch. McKenna again lands a right to body and they clinch, sparring at the bell.

ROUND THREE They spar around the ring, McDonald puts a right and then a left to McKenna's chin and they clinch. McDonald missed a hay-maker and they clinch, they exchange body punches close in and again clinch McDonald lands his left to head and misses with his right to face, McKenna drives three hard ones to body and they clinch. McDonald finds McKenna's head with a right and they clinch, McKenna.
