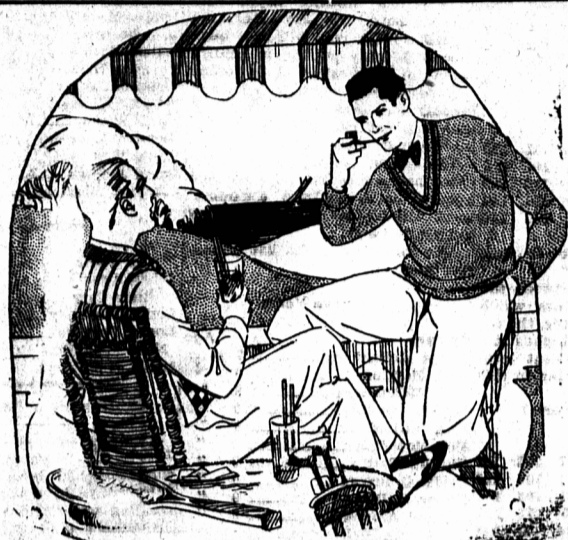

Warlers' Plucky Act

PARIS May 22.—There are all the elements of a sensational and dramatic film in an incident that has happened at the prison at Nogent-le-Rotrou. This small prison is watched by a single warder, Emile Borne, and when he entered the men's cell one morning he found that the second door was open and the ground covered with rubble. A hole had been made in the wall and before the warder could get over his amazement two of the prisoners Le Moligne, and Fontanel, flung themselves upon him, the one attempting to strangle him, the other snatching his keys and throwing him to the ground. Two other prisoners lay in a corner of the cell and watched the struggle. Le Moligne and Fontanel locked the warder into the cell and then crossed the yard and opened an iron gate which separated the prison from the warder's house. Seeing the fugitives, the warder's wife shouted for help and, seizing two revolvers, fired at them. Taking no heed of the flying bullets, the desperadoes smashed a window and, entering the kitchen, picked up a hatchet and another implement and attempted to smash the door which stood between them and freedom. While they were hammering at the door Mrs. Borne was able to liberate her husband, who accompanied by

the two other prisoners, went in search of the fugitives. Another struggle began. The ruffians could do nothing, they held up their hands and were seized and taken back to the cell. Le Moligne had been sentenced to six years' and his companion to four years' for thieving.
