DEATH OF MRS. CHARLOTTE CAMERON—There passed away on Wednesday at the home of her son, Mr. Keith Cameron, at Summerside, Mrs. Charlotte Cameron, at the ripe age of eighty years. The deceased lady had been in her usual health until Monday, when she was seized with a paralytic stroke from which she did not rally and passed quietly away on Wednesday afternoon. Mrs. Cameron was a native of Carleton but had lived for many years in Summerside. She was the widow of the late Mr. Benjamin Cameron of Summerside, and it is a remarkable coincidence that his death twelve years ago took place on the same day in February. Mrs. Cameron was a woman of many sterling qualities, devoted to her home and family. She was a devout member of the Presbyterian Church and was noted for her many kindly actions. There are left to mourn two sons, George of Amherst, N. S., and Keith, of Messrs. Sinclair and Stewart, Ltd., with whom she has resided for a number of years; also three sisters, namely: Mrs. Manson McNeill of North Tryon; Mrs. (Dr.) Reynolds, of Santa Anna, Calif.; Miss Katie Manson, also of California, and ten grandchildren and one great grandchild, to all of whom much sympathy is expressed. The funeral takes place this (Friday) morning at 10 o'clock with a service at the residence of her son, Mr. Keith Cameron, and from thence to Cape Traverse, Rev. C. J. St. Clair Jeans officiating in Summerside. S.

FUNERAL OF CAPTAIN LOUIS RAZAVET—The funeral of the late Captain Louis Razavet of Summerside, took place on Thursday morning from the residence to St. Paul's Church, where Requiem High Mass was celebrated and a special mass was rendered by the choir. In spite of the intense cold the funeral was largely attended and many followed the remains to their last resting place in the R. C. Cemetery. DISMISSED FOR WANT OF EVIDENCE—The party from Norway, Lot 1, who was arrested by Preventive Officer Frank J. Platts on Friday last and lodged in the Prince County Jail on Saturday, charged with having in his possession spirits which had been illegally manufactured, was tried on Tuesday in the Court House before Messrs. Alexander Campbell and John E. Campbell, J. P.'s for Prince County. Officers F. J. Platts and Keir Mann gave evidence of finding several bottles of moonshine and some mash under the floor of the horse stable. Customs Officer H. M. Baker gave evidence that the liquor was thirty under proof. The defendant and his three sons were in the house at the time of the seizure and at the trial the father denied having anything to do with the liquor in question; he also proved that he was not the legal owner of the farm, the property being owned by one of his sons. The officers stated that they arrested the defendant because he appeared to them to be the head of the place. The Magistrate after hearing argument of counsel adjourned the case for judgment on Wednesday at 2 p. m., when they dismissed the case for want of sufficient evidence to connect the accused with the liquor and discharged the prisoner from custody, after he had been in jail over four days. Mr. Thane Campbell conducted the case for the prosecution, the prisoner being defended by Mr. Heath Strong, K. C. S.

Late Market News

(Canadian Press) MONTREAL, Que., Feb. 6.—(Produce)—Local dairy and produce markets continued active today as firm tone prevailed. No further downward movement is expected within the next few weeks local dealers state. Butter remained steady at 36 to 36 1/2 cents for New Zealand and finest eastern townships varieties. Receipts included some six thousand cases of the former today. Retail prices remain steady at 39 cents for solids and 40 cents for prints. Egg prices held firm with a continued demand for the fresh varieties. Higher prices are expected next week dealers state. Cheese continued quiet as is natural at this season with easterns quoted at 19 to 19 1/2 cents and westerns at 19 cents. No changes took place in the local potato market with prices firm at from \$1.75 to \$1.85. Dressed poultry prices were again unchanged. OTTAWA, Ont., Feb. 6.—(Eggs)—There is a considerable firmer tone on egg markets in the Maritime Provinces today. Some decline is reported in western prices, but in central Canada the markets are unchanged. TORONTO—The egg market here is unchanged today, but continues unsettled. Dealers are quoting country shippers for ungraded eggs extras 45-46, firsts 42-43, pullet extras 37-38, seconds, 35. Import shipments of United States fresh eggs are still being brought in quite freely. MONTREAL—Egg receipts here today were 1,328 cases as compared to 470 cases on the corresponding day last year. The market is firm under a good demand and fairly light receipts. Several cars of U. S. and British Columbia eggs are rolling here and are expected to relieve the shortage. ST. JOHN—There is a brisk demand for eggs on this market. Supplies are scarce and are keeping well cleaned up and it is probable that unless receipts increase considerably some price advance may take place shortly. Many outside points are inquiring here for supplies. Prices of eggs to retailers are slightly higher at extras 53-55, firsts 52-54, seconds 44-46. HALIFAX—This egg market is holding very firm under a good demand for all grades. Local fresh receipts are light and are being quickly absorbed by the trade. With the weather unfavourable for production a shortage of local supplies is looked for. EDMONTON—The egg market here is lower. Country shippers are now receiving for ungraded eggs extras 40, firsts 38, seconds 27. Antique works of sculpture are being reproduced in embossed leather in Italy.
