THE NEW BRITISH CABINET.

The cable tells that Premier Balfour has at length succeeded in his long and difficult task of reconstructing the cabinet, so sadly depleted of its strength by the resignation of a number of its leading spirits. The reconstruction is after all little more than a shuffle of portfolios and the promotion of comparatively unknown men to places before held by those of greater fame. The changes are thus stated:

Mr. Broderick, formerly Secretary for War, succeeds Lord George Hamilton as Secretary for India.

Austen Chamberlain, Postmaster General, succeeds Mr. Ritchie as Chancellor of the Exchequer.

Alfred Lyttleton, Recorder of Oxford, succeeds Joseph Chamberlain as Secretary for the Colonies.

H. O. Arnold Foster, Secretary to the Admiralty, succeeds Mr. Broderick as Secretary for War.

Graham Murray, Lord Advocate of Scotland, succeeds Lord Balfour of Burleigh, as Secretary for Scotland.

Lord Stanley, financier of the War Office succeeds Austen Chamberlain as Postmaster General.

No one who compares the new Cabinet with that which it succeeds but must be impressed with the great diminution of weight and prestige by the retirement of such men as Chamberlain, the Duke of Devonshire, Lord George Hamilton and Mr Ritchie the late Chancellor. And this is coupled with the fact that a number of the Premier's late colleagues who have retired have avowed their opposition to the fiscal departure to which he is partly and Mr. Chamberlain is wholly committed. It seems not to be expected that the new Cabinet can long retain control of the nation's affairs, and a dissolution of Parliament at an early date seems to be expected by all parties. The Unionist party indeed seems to be on the eve of a breakup, and it will not be surprising if in the near future there shall be a reconstruction of both the Government and Opposition party forces upon lines that have been unknown for a generation past.

That the Chamberlain influence is still strong in the Ministerial party may be taken for granted by some features of the reconstruction as well as the attitude of the men who have retired. Mr. Austen Chamberlain's promotion to the Chancellorship of the Exchequer while his father is engaged in what the Opposition feel to be a protectionist campaign is a notable feature.

The Duke of Devonshire has coupled his resignation with an avowal of his devoted adherence to free trade. In fact the salient feature of the political situation appears to be that the old battle of free trade and protection, however disguised, will be the real controversy in the coming campaign. A preference for the colonies in the home market coupled with a desire to further the unification of the Empire are no doubt strong underlying motives with Mr. Chamberlain and many of his supporters, but it will be a difficult task to make these features dominant. The Opposition will refuse to treat the contest as any other than one between free trade and protection—protection for its own sake with the concomitants of dearer food and dearer raw materials.

Imperial considerations will doubtless in time force themselves into prominence but in the first campaign the battle must be fought out mainly on grounds that affect the taxpayers of the United Kingdom. And the nation is too thoroughly indoctrinated with the principles of free trade to give much if any chance for early victory to the Chamberlain policy. It is not improbable that both Premier Balfour and the ex-Colonial Secretary see this quite plainly and are content to ride for a fall, believing that in the future free trade must be abandoned and they will then reap their reward.
