# STOCK QUOTATIONS

## Stock Markets At A Glance

**NEW YORK, Sept. 27 (AP)**—The stock market today had a few firm areas and some that were a bit soft, but final variations mostly were in minor fractions.

The Associated Press 60 stock composite was unchanged at 543.3. Rail and utility averages registered slight gains.

Canadian stocks were mixed, Walter adding a full point, C. P. R. 5-8, Seagrams and Dome 1-8, while Lake Shore dropped 1-4 and McIntyre 1-8.

**MONTREAL, Sept. 27 (CP)**—Largely due to strength in Quebec electric, utilities were pegged higher in the indices after trading today on the stock exchange and curb market. Papers, industrials and banks were lower. Electric, market students said, got a lift on strength of the removal of restrictions on power and papers dropped after firming Tuesday, on state men's from newspaper sources that the removal will not help the industry until next spring.

**LONDON, Sept. 27 (CP)**—There was no major price changes at the close of the stock market following a quiet session today. Industrials closed irregular. Oils eased, home rails scored losses. International securities were uncertain and British funds were quiet.

**WINNIPEG, Sept. 27 (CP)**—Domestic cash market trade on the Winnipeg grain exchange today included small quantities of oats taken by shippers. No export trade was reported. The futures closed 1-3-4-1 higher with the October 18-14, Dec. 98, May 98 3-8-1-2.

**CHICAGO, Sept. 27 (AP)**—Wheat rallied today when light covering showed scarcity of offerings but most other grain futures were easy in irregular trade. Barley suffered the heaviest loss and at one time was off as much as 3-4 cents.

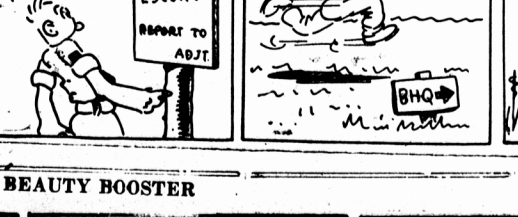

Mrs. George Mellish and Mrs. Robert Mellish were appointed on sick committee. Mrs. Ira Ross made offer of some bags for quilting.

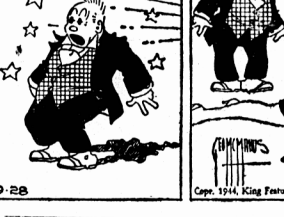
Mrs. Kestle Ross invited members for next meeting. Meeting adjourned. A dairy lunch was served by hostess.
