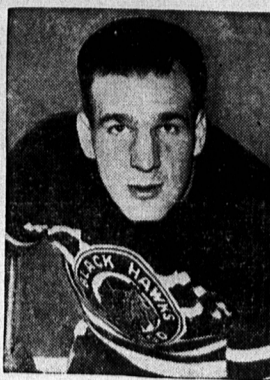

About the sportiest bird I know (and I know most of them) is the Hungarian Partridge, commonly known as "the Hun." This beautiful bird, about twice the size of a quail, is extremely plentiful in the Farnlands of Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta.

During the past season great numbers of American sport men visited Western Canada. Many of them inspected (and commended) the great restoration work being carried out by Ducks Unlimited.

Nearly all of them got a great thrill and a lot of pleasure out of hunting Huns.

It is noticed that some sportsmen, who are used to hunting quail, endeavour to use the same strategy in hunting Huns. This, of course, is a mistake. You may be able to sneak up on quail but you cannot do that with the Hun.

Huns explode out of the cover like lightning from a shell; you have got to shoot. If you see a covey of Huns light at a certain spot, you want to be there in 10 seconds flat, or they are a hundred yards further. A good dog will hold them about the same length of time; 10 seconds. So, when a point is made, you don't cautiously approach the location indicated by the noise of your canine assistant; but you immediately start on a dog trot ready to shoot as soon as you are within range.

Sydney edges Victorias 3-2 In overtime

SYDNEY, N.S., Nov. 10—(CP)—Carl Ripley's goal in the last minute of overtime gave Sydney a 3-2 win over North Sydney. Victorias tonight and sent Millionaires into a two-game lead in the Cape Breton Hockey League.

With the score tied 2-2, the first and last-place teams had battled through 9:07 minutes of extra play when Ripley combined with Bill McGregor and Jack Atchison for the winner. His collaborators each had a hand in one of the previous two goals.

Snead wins In Argentina

VILLA ALLENDE, Argentina, Nov. 10—(CP)—Sam Snead, joint driving United States golf professional, won the Central Argentina Open today with a 72-hole total of 280—12 under par for the four rounds over the Cordoba course.

His travelling companion, Jimmy Demaret, was second with 289. In winning the title Snead made his best showing since arriving in this country, never going over par. He had rounds of 67-71—134 yesterday and added cards of 69-73 today. Par is 70.

Demaret, the Texas shotmaker who recently won the Argentine National Open title, was fifth at the end of yesterday's firing and moved into the runner-up spot this morning with a 69. He added a 74 after lunch.

ATLANTA, Ga., Nov. 10—(AP)—Clint Castiberry, record-challenging halfback of Boys' High School, were less efficient as touchdown maker, maybe he'd be much happier.

Castiberry, sophomore triple-threat ace of the undefeated, untied Boys' High team, is a school-boy sensation. He has scored 90 points against eight opponents so far this season, and that's the catch. To keep the score down, coach Shorty Doyal usually lets Castiberry play only the first quarter. Then he benches him while the second and third stringers carry the load.

The team has rolled up 353 points against none for its opponents, and is well on the way to a second straight unbeaten season. The scoring has averaged 44 points a game, which Doyal thinks is entirely too much.

Clint worried of the whole thing after being benched last week-end at the start of a 46-0 rout of Jordan High of Columbus, Ga. Seeking out Doyal, he pleaded: "Please let me in there. Let me play guard. Let me play anywhere. I don't want to run with the ball. I want to play some."

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Oil pours from Pipeline leak

BETHEL, Me., Nov. 9—(AP)—Oil geysered high out of the 236-mile Portland-Montreal pipeline today in an opening that was unofficial and a day ahead of time.

A preliminary flow of oil being pumped in to test the artery for its formal start of operation tomorrow streaked through a broken valve gasket, splattering nearby woods and leaving a black puddle four feet deep and 50 feet in circumference.

Several thousand barrels were lost through the break, which took crews eight hours to repair.

Wood Captain Of '42 Ryder Cup team

CHICAGO, Nov. 10—(AP)—Craig Wood, United States Open Champion, was appointed captain of the 1942 Ryder Cup golf team at the annual meeting of the Professional Golfers Association today.

Also named to the team were Jimmy Demaret, Vic Ghezzi, Ben Hogan, Lloyd Mangrum, Harold McGowan, Byron Nelson, Gene Sarazen, Horace Smith and Sam Snead. Ghezzi is P.G.A. champion and Hogan is the year's leading money winner.

Walter Hagen was made honorary captain of the team. Demaret, Mangrum and Hogan had been named to the squad. Nelson, Snead, Smith, McSpaden and Ghezzi were on the last Ryder Cup team, and Sarazen was a member of the first group ever chosen and also was picked on several subsequent squads.

The P.G.A. also announced that Fred Crooran of Boston had been tendered a three-year contract as tournament bureau manager.

The election of officers is expected to take place Wednesday.

Lux Knitting Book Supreme

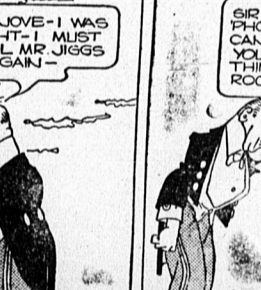
