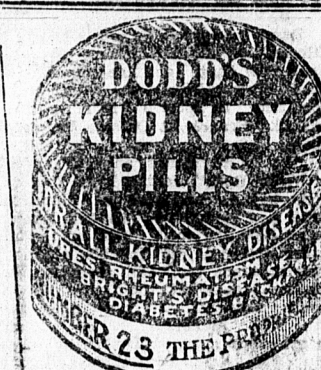

GRADUATING EXERCISES
AT STATE HOSPITAL.

The annual graduation exercises of
the Taunton State Hospital Training
School for Nurses occurred last even-
ing, the twenty-fourth of May, at the
institution hall and were most suc-
cessfully carried out. A very large
attendance was present, in spite of
the driving storm, while in addition
to the local people there were a num-
ber of out-of-town guests in attend-
ance. The exercises were impressive
and in addition to an informal recep-
tion, there was a ball that added to
the merriment of the evening.

Promptly at 8 o'clock the even-
ing's program opened with a selection
of the orchestra while the graduates
marched in procession to their
places. Following prayer by Rev. P. R.
Sturtevant, Dr. Arthur V. Goss, the
Superintendent of the hospital, who
presided, introduced as the speaker
of the evening E. E. Southard, M.
D., of Boston, of the state board of
insanity. Dr. Southard, one of the
state's leading insanity specialists,
and who is to be director of the
\$800,000 hospital now nearing com-
pletion at Boston, took for his sub-
ject a part of the work of Professor
James. He read from a book written
by Professor James about the moral
equivalent of war. Professor James
says war is most attractive to hu-
man nature and something had to be
done to do away with the wars, if
possible. Likewise with disease,
something must be done to do away
with so much disease.

Dr. Southard then explained how
there are three systems to this work,
namely—medicine, hygiene and social
service. By means of a chart he il-
lustrated these three branches show-
ing by means of a small circle the
medicine practice. Surrounding this
circle is a larger one, indicating hygi-
ene, and still a third circle outside
the two represented the social ser-
vice, and it is this work that the
nurse must do. Dr. Southard explain-
ed how the nurse must co-operate
with the medicine and hygiene prac-
titioners.

Dr. Goss next introduced Miss Flo-
rence Mima Woodbridge, who delivered
the valedictory address. Miss Wood-
bridge expressed the feelings of the
graduates in a most pleasing manner,
and, as the class arose, expressed the
thanks of every member and bade
farewell to the officials who prepared
them during their course of study.
At the conclusion, Miss Reta G.
Cameron, superintendent of nurses,
presented the class to Dr. Goss, stat-
ing that all had passed examinations
and qualified for diplomas. Dr. Goss
in a few words informed Dr. Sted-
man, chairman of the board of trust-
ees, that he knew from personal
knowledge that every member of the
class was worthy of receiving the
honors of the school. Dr. Stedman
then presented the diplomas, the fol-
lowing receiving their credentials—
The Misses Edith Annis, May Bar-
rett, Mattie Clough, Myrtle Garrison,
Ida Irwin, Margaret McNeill, Mahel
Mills, Harriet Murray, Eliza Orbis,
Etta Pascal, Anna Reid, Lottie Rich-
ardson, and Florence Woodbridge,
John Connolly, Frederick Libbey,
Dunham McKay, Samuel Scribner and
John Wheelock. Prayer was again of-
fered and the graduates retired to
the rotunda, where an informal re-

ception was held.
Following the reception the annual
graduation ball occurred. The grand
march was led by Dr. Goss and wife,
followed by officials, invited guests,
the graduates and escorts. An excel-
lent order of dances was run off and
a very enjoyable evening was spent
by all. Dr. Ripley was floor direct-
or. Miss Thelma Stanfield and Ross
J. McCann were aides, musical direc-
tor P. R. Provost. This is the large-
st class to graduate from the school
and it has been noticeable that year
after year the number increases; the
graduates are also securing very ca-
pable positions throughout the coun-
try, which speaks highly for the
efficient superintendent of nurses, who
was presented with a handsome chafin-
dish as a remembrance from the class.
It is appropriately marked and is a
fitting testimonial of the class appre-
ciation of her excellent work in di-
recting the class.—The above men-
tioned Miss Woodbridge is a daughter
of Thomas and Mrs. Woodbridge,
Covehead Road, and sister of Miss
Ella, graduate nurse, now holding a
good position in Bournemouth Hospi-
tal, Brookline, Mass. The former has
entered the Boston City Hospital for
a general course in nursing. All wish
her the best of success in the high
profession she has chosen.

STRANGE IDEA OF ONTARIO MAN
BELLVILLE, Ont., June 21—
Silvester Sabin, attempting to found
a new religious cult, has ended a
meteoric career in the insane asylum,
to which he was committed yester-
day. Sabin's came to the little vil-
lage of Brighton in 1903 from Ro-
chester. He is a religious fanatic of
almost pronounced type. He gives
adherence to no religious denomina-
tion, but interprets the Bible liter-
ally and makes it conform to his own
crazy views. He considers himself to
be a reincarnation of Jacob, his wife
is Rachel and his children were re-
named Ephraim, Reuben, Peter and
Ruth under some of the old Biblical
characters come back to earth. Sa-
bin's mode of life was as strange as
his religious beliefs. He lived the
year round in tents mounted on wood-
en wheels that he had himself man-
ufactured. The family diet was re-
stricted to fish, fruit, home-made
bread, honey, milk, butter and eggs.
They wore no clothing unless made
from animals. A sort of smock made
from linen and a pair of linen knick-
erbockers completed their dress. This
was the clothing worn in the winter
as well as in summer. Sabin's in-
duced C. Vincent, a well-to-do Presbyterian
