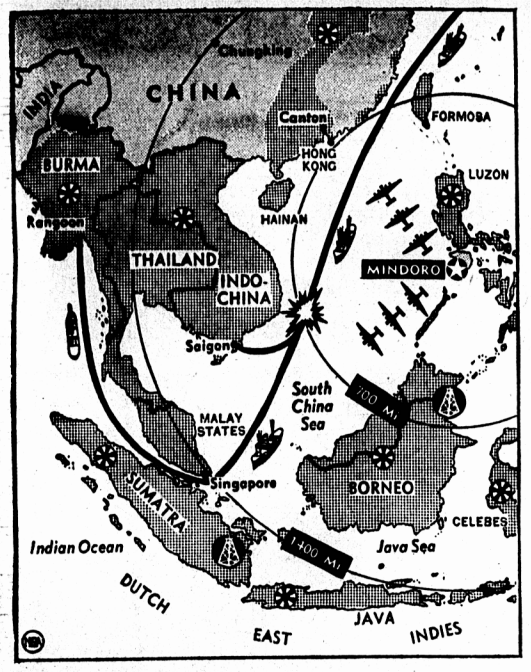

Enemy Stalled In Alsace Is Belief

"Red Devils" Fight As Ground Troops

WITH THE BRITISH "LEASE LEND" TROOPS, Jan. 8.—(CP-Reuters)—The British 8th Airborne Division, the "Red Devils" fighting in the Ardennes, played a big part in the capture of Bure. They made no parachute jumps or glider landings but the frozen roads and icy slopes of the Ardennes carried almost as much risk of a broken limb as an airborne landing.

PARIS, Jan. 8.—(AP)—The Germans were retiring tonight from the dear-won tip of their Belgian positions—possibly all the way back to St. Vith, four miles from the German border—under shrewd blows from four Allied armies that knocked out 15 miles of one main escape route and covered the second with artillery fire.

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Budapest Is Unhealthy Spot

MOSCOW, Jan. 8.—(CP-Reuters)—After long and patient work by German sappers Budapest has become a crazy city in which nothing is what it seems. Comfortable arm chairs tempting the battle-weary street fighters go up in clouds of smoke, and bottles of beer lie invitingly on tables in the waterless city clubs. Even civilians are often not expatriates at all but Germans in disguise.

2,000 R. A. F. Men Repairing Houses

LONDON, Jan. 8.—(CP-Reuters)—Two thousand R. A. F. men have been at work repairing more than 1,500 houses in bomb-damaged southern England. It was announced today. They are part of R.A.F. Technical Training Command which has put in 2,186,800 man hours since it repaired its first house last July.
