

New Publication Deals With Island Fox Industry

The "Theory and Practice of Fox Ranching" by Dr. J. A. Allen and W. Chester S. McClure, M. L. A., practical fox rancher and dealer in silver black fox pelts, is now completed and is being turned off the press.

The volume, magnificently bound has two-hundred and forty-eight pages of valuable and interesting reading. It is crammed full of exceptional information on the "theory and practice of fox ranching."

Although written primarily for the practical fox farmer, the work should be equally valuable to the veterinarian, prospective fox rancher and the general public; in fact the book is for the masses, and to be sure a veritable encyclopedia—a "gold mine" of facts, parts of which a child can read and understand.

The authors have written exhaustively about some of the important diseases, not because such diseases are rampant in fox ranches, but because of their potential danger, as foxes are not specially prone to disease. Twelve chapters in all make up the volume which is profusely illustrated with over a score of cuts, including portraits of some of Prince Edward Island's leading pioneer fox ranchers, microscopic photographs, etc.

Cancer Treatment Claims Lack Substantiation

VICTORIA, B. C., June 29.—Cancer is still the medical profession's greatest mystery, according to Dr. James Miller, of Queen's University, Kingston, Ont., who addressed the Canadian Medical Convention here on the present conditions of the problem.

New treatments, claimed to be curative, had been advanced recently but had yet to be substantiated, he declared. Meanwhile, it was incorrect to say nothing was known of cancer. A vast amount of study has been given the disease and much valuable data have been secured.

Referring to the theory announced by Dr. William E. Gye of London last year, Dr. Miller said it has been shattered by subsequent experiments in the United States, conducted by Dr. James Murphy. Dr. Gye has not answered the Murphy contentions and still had to substantiate his claim. Dr. Gye, said Dr. Miller, has attempted to cultivate the supposed cancer germ in a special medium. His experiments had tended to show that two bodies were present and his theory was that there was both cancer germ and a chemical factor.

Dr. Miller viewed more favorably the lead treatment of Dr. Blair Bell, of Liverpool, from which striking results have been claimed. According to the discoverer, some 40 cases had been treated successfully but it was not known, said Dr. Miller, what proportion these were of the total number treated.

Unique Degree Conferred on Arctic Explorer

Byrd of Arctic aerial fame is the possessor of a degree created especially for him in recognition of his leadership of the first successful air expedition to the North Pole. The unique degree is that of doctor of longitude and latitude conferred on him by the American Geographical Society last night when the aviator delivered his first lecture on his polar experiences.
