The latest news, first of all.

Monday's Foreign Mail reached the Summerside Post Office by train at 2 p. m. yesterday.

Among the passengers delayed so long in Summerside were Dr. Dougherty, Cape Traverse; Father Douglad, Tignish; and A. A. McCall, Ellerslie.

The death took place yesterday of Mrs. Currie, wife of James Currie, Richmond, in the seventy-sixth year of her age, after an illness of some weeks.

The Rev. S. S. Bamford, will deliver one of his popular lectures on the Market Hall, Summerside, on Tuesday the 18th inst. Particulars later.

The following are the Alberton market prices:—White oats per bus 38c; black oats per bus 39c; eggs per doz 22 cents, butter per lb 20 cents, hides per lb 10c, pork per lb 8 1/2 to 9 cents and hayloose per ton \$9.

In Summerside yesterday dealers were paying 91 cents a lb for pork; 10 cents a lb for hides; 25c a doz for eggs; \$8.50 a ton for loose hay; \$4.50 a ton for loose straw; 20 cents a bus for potatoes and 18 to 25 a lb for butter and 40 to 41c a bus for oats.

Many friends in Prince Edward Island will regret to hear of the death of Mrs. William Carroll which took place at her home in Taunton, Mass., on Jan. 2, 1910, after only one week's illness of pneumonia. Her husband, one son and a daughter survive. Deceased was a daughter of the late Hugh McLean of Port Hill and of a large family, three are still living, viz Mrs. Flora Maynard of Port Hill; Mrs. Sarah Turner, Tyne Valley and Mrs. Margaret Stevenson, Moulis River, N. B. Mrs. Carroll left Prince Edward Island about thirty years ago, and since that time has resided in Taunton, where she made hosts of friends who sincerely mourn her death. In her last illness she was tenderly cared for by her family and all that skilled medical attendance and trained nursing could do was done but all in vain. Her funeral was held on Jan. 5th, Rev. Archibald McCord officiating. Solos were rendered by Louis Walker and the casket was laden with beautiful flowers which testified in a mute way the esteem in which she was held. She was seventy-six years old and was all her life a devoted member of the Presbyterian church. Interment was at Mayflower Hill Cemetery, Taunton, Mass.

St. Paul's Church, Summerside, was the scene of a pleasant event yesterday morning, when Miss Zena Perry, daughter of Lucean Perry, of Summerside, and Abel Arseneault were united in Marriage by Rev. J. C. McLean. The bride was attended by Miss Lena Wedge while the groom was supported by Fred Murphy.

The regular meeting of the Summerside Town Council was held Monday night. The principal business transacted was the adjusting of the accounts for 1909 and preparing them for publication. The accounts showed a surplus of \$1020.64. A grant of \$25 was given the directors of the seed fair. The year book will be ready for the public in about two weeks.

From early morning till a late hour last night every effort was made to release the four engines and the two trains stuck in the snow near New Annan Station. A large gang of snow fighters were at work removing the snow from the track which was almost as hard as brick-clay. Teams from the town were busy carrying men with shovels, provisions for the men and coal for the engines. At 7 p. m. all train were again cancelled. It is expected that at an early hour this a. m. the track will be clear as there was still a number of men keeping up the fight at a late hour last night.

At the regular meeting of Court Chataqua, I. O. Foresters, S. side, held Friday night last, the following officers were elected for the ensuing year: Court Deputy, Neil McLeod; Chief Ranger, William Muttart, East Chief, John D. Coss; Vice Chief, Colin Milligan; Recording Secretary, Nelson Alward; Financial Secretary, John Morrison; Treasurer, John Grady; Physicians, Doctors McLellan, Jardine and John McNeill; Orators, A. J. McCormack; Organist, E. H. Wright; Sr. Woodward, Stanley Dunn Jr.; Woodward, Arthur Sharpe; Sr. Deadle, Vernon; Mithews; Trustees, John M. Clark, Neil McLeod. The officers were installed by L. U. Fowler.

Many and various were the scenes round the waiting rooms at the Summerside Station during the past few days, among the two hundred passengers from East and West headed here by the railway tie-up. On the evening of the first day, when it was announced that all trains were cancelled until next morning, nearly everybody took the situation calmly and proceeded to the hotels or to lodge with friends and enjoy themselves as comfortably as possible, but in the morning when it became known that 50 men were wanted to dig out the show bound train, they began to take a more serious view of the situation. Some at once set out on foot to walk to their homes, others offered to take a hand in digging out the train. But this required the purchase of a shovel out of their own purse which had already been reduced. They withdrew their offer. One woman who left six children at her home two miles from Summerside, the eldest only twelve years of age, was almost wild with excitement and could hardly be prevailed upon by friends from starting to walk to her home. As the day passed towards evening many began to realize that the end was not yet and that they might have to spend still another night away from their homes. Some grew quite angry and began to speak out in forcible language. This only gave amusement to others who were of a more tor-bearing nature. However, late in the evening, they began one by one to leave the waiting room and at 8 p. m. the railway station was the quietest place in town.

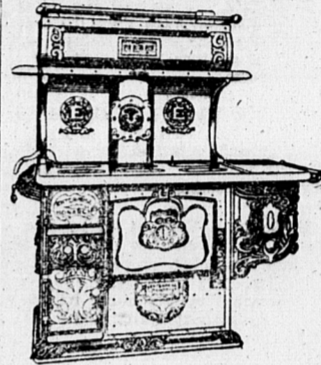
