

### THE POPE'S ACTION IN THE WAR

(Continued from page ten.)

opposing sides in this murderous conflict. What is the Pope to do? Germany and France are divided in the war. Two German Cardinals have signified their intention of laying their side of the case before the Holy See. But, as said before, at the present stage of warfare how can it be possible for anyone, however truthfully impartial he may be, to collect the necessary evidence for decision on this most important subject? Any decision upon the Pope's action must await the Pontiff himself. Would he be quoted in every university and Catholic pulpit to generations yet unborn. The Pope knows well those words from the inspired Volume: "There is a time to be silent and there is time to speak." He is waiting for the opportunity and when that time comes under the help and guidance of God, we shall then have a pronouncement which shall bring light and comfort to the world.

"Let us remember that the Pope is not a statesman, but a shepherd of nations whom rupture and war divide. He is not a Pressman to give to the whole world by means of the daily papers his ideas upon the means of securing peace. Nor is he a politician or an ambassador. He is the monarch of his people. Not to the Press do we turn for an accurate statement of what he has said. Only his briefs and bulls, if we could have them, is it correctly stated.

"As to what the Pope has said regarding the war, many misrepresentations of his views have appeared in the daily papers. Some time ago you will remember he wrote a letter to the Cardinal, dean of the Sacred College, of methods of warfare which were contrary to the law of nations and international rights. He stands by that and defines the law of nations as established at the Hague Conventions, and that category we certainly find that it is against the law of nations to bombard undefended towns; that it is against the law to use poisoned gas; and to destroy passenger ships without due notice, whereby the destruction of the lives of innocents cannot be avoided. All these things are contrary to the Hague rules as being contrary to the law of nations. Therefore, though he has not specially condemned these actions, surely his plea for abiding by the law of nations, and international rights is sufficiently clear.

### AGITATED WAR JUMBLE AFTER CHAMPAGNE SPELLS VICTORY

PARIS, Oct. 4.—(delayed)—Here is the first actual description of the Champagne battlefield strewn with dead and wounded, just as it looked during the opening phase of the terrific struggle which is now continuing. It was written by a former correspondent who recently was wounded, but rejoined his battery on the second day of the offensive.

"After two sleepless nights on the train with little to eat, we reached a station in Champagne I was tired. Nevertheless my heart thrilled with joy, for before me was a column of 600 prisoners, while all about them through a crowd of officers and soldiers rushed incessantly automobiles, trucks, supply wagons in an agitated jumble which told of victory.

### Victory the Word

"Victory," a word which is an intoxicating, triumphant word. It was information that I had to go twelve miles to rejoin my comrades and I immediately began to seek means of transportation. I made the journey on an engine on a narrow-gauge railway which carries ammunition to the front.

"I arrived September 26, just a day after our troops assaulted and pierced the German trenches and swept forward two to three miles. I was formed in a column to visit the battlefield, for a party was just going to bring a body of comrades back for burial.

"We reached the French first line of trenches, picked our way through the remains of barbed wire entanglements, and I was beyond me the German barbed wire.

"We saw the effects of the terrible bombardment. Here and there we saw shells burst open. Then we came to the first German trench, and for the first time the war presented itself to us in a sort of vivid unreality, the impression of which is unforgettable.

### Like Huge Wax Museum

"Have you ever been in a waxwork museum where motionless figures in natural positions startle you by their appearance, and which at the same time you know to be false? Here is a trench, the walls of which have saved in. Amid a scattering of all sorts of objects, grenades, cartridges, canned food, packs of cards, pieces of bread, personal letters, coats, and other pieces of clothing were many bodies of men, some of them in lifelike attitudes, quite dead. One German man lying on his side seemed quietly resting. Fully equipped, with belt buckled and eyes wide open, staring straight ahead, he looked like some one who had just spoken to you and was waiting with kindly attention for your answer.

### Corpses Twisted Together

"In some places the effect of the bombardment was terrible. Two enormous 10-6 inch shells lay side by side in a great hole torn by another which had caused the whole side trench to cave in.

"At every ten yards at most were corpses, sometimes several twisted together. I was surprised to see some with arms raised unsupported. One leaned upright against a trench without a rifle, but in the act of taking off his arms and fingers were held correctly, but sticking stiffly into the air. I should have thought his arms would have fallen of their own weight after death.

### Interior Trenches

"We presently neared the second line of German trenches—inferior to ours—too narrow and don't zig-zag enough. Also inferior to German first-line trenches, which were wide, deep, walled with planks, and filled with subterranean shelters.

"We were now about a kilometre inside the German lines, and noticed that we could not take a step without treading on shell splinters. A regular half of steel had fallen there. The Germans had concealed machine guns there at the edge of the wood, and the wood itself was thickly strewn with French and German dead.

"There was a fine evening, and for the first time in a long while we had before us a battlefield where it was really possible to see something. Yonder at our left several batteries were firing rapidly, and flames shot from the cannons' mouths in quick succession. Some German shells sought to reach a battery at a kilometre distant without succeeding.

"There was an astonishing disproportion between the number of shells fired and received. I estimate we shot ten shells to the enemy's two. The advance at this point had been about 48 miles in a straight line."

### SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

OCTOBER 10, 1913.

#### ELIJAH TAKEN UP TO HEAVEN

II. Kings 2:1-12. GOLDEN TEXT.

"In thy presence is fulness of joy. In thy right hand there are pleasures forevermore."—Ps. 16, 11.

Verses 1-6. When Elijah felt that the moment for his passing away had come, he made three distinct efforts to separate himself from Elisha, and meet the crisis alone. The first time he desired his companion to remain at Gilgal, a sacred place where a company of prophets lived together. He would himself proceed to Bethel. But Elisha, who had premonitions of the master's approaching departure would not be left behind. From Bethel Elisha wished to go to Jericho alone, but Elijah insisted on keeping him company there. At the end of the fourteen miles journey from Bethel to Jericho Elijah made one more effort to isolate himself by going to the Jordan five to six miles further on without Elisha. But Elisha declined to be left behind. The whole transaction raises questions: Why did Elijah desire to be alone at his passing away? And why would Elisha insist on keeping close to him? The first question is especially important because when the solemn moment came to pass from the present to the future life they always crave for sympathy and companionship. Even Jesus at Gethsemane took his most intimate disciples with himself in order to lean upon their human sympathy. Did not Elijah feel the need of a human heart in the critical moment when he faced the eternal life of the future? James tells us that he "was of like passions (nature) with us." He certainly appreciated companionship. It could not have been for his own sake that he sought to leave his disciples behind at the time of his passing. He thought that Elisha would be stronger for his work looking at the issues before him through his own experience. He must cease depending on Elijah and depend on God's provision with him and his own equipment for service. The time comes when every disciple must cut loose from his master. The time had come according to Elijah for the younger man to be set adrift and find his own bearings. The fact that in the end he yielded to the insistence of Elisha took him to the scene of his translation shows that it was not a matter of principle, but one of judgment with him.

But why did Elisha cling to Elijah so tenaciously at this moment? The question is not as simple to answer. First of all we think of personal devotion as moving his heart. He had learned to love his aged master, and to trust in him in every moment of possible need. But the narrative hints at the expectation of some mysterious occurrence in connection with Elijah's "taking away." The "sons of the prophets" had a foreboding of that event and Elisha himself was aware of its imminence. What would be the circumstances? The question must have interested him. But over and above these motives Elisha yearned for the blessing of a fuller prophetic power that might come to him if he clung to the great prophet to the very last. It is by close, persistent, yearning intimacy that moral and spiritual gifts and powers are passed over from person to person. The transmission is very like the transfusion of blood, which can take place only as the recipient and giver are in actual touch with each other.

Verses 7-12. When Elijah resigned himself to the presence of his disciples on the occasion of his leaving the earth he took his mantle and, through its use opened a way across the waters of the Jordan. It was a demonstration of the power given him from above, and if proof were needed, it proved to Elisha once more the extraordinary endowment of his master. It must have aroused in him anxious questionings. Would Elijah's power cease with him? Could Israel; could the world afford to get along without it? Was it possible that he himself might receive that power as a legacy from the departing prophet? These are the questions that occur when some great and influential figure is removed from the world. Men ask, "How shall we go on without him? Who will rise to take his place?"

Elisha was now ready for Elijah's question. "Ask what I shall do for thee before I be taken away from thee?" And his answer was prompt and appropriate, "I pray thee—let a double portion of thy spirit be upon me." The phrase does not mean, "Let me have twice as much as you have of this power," but "Give me an eldest son's share in thy wealth." For the "double portion" was the oldest son's share in the father's estate (Deut. 21:17). What Elisha asked for was a place in the prophetic succession. He begged Elijah make him his oldest son as a prophet. It was a

### HOW TO MAKE SOUP.

Soup cannot be made in a hurry. As remnants of meat, bones, bacon and pieces of every description should be used to make stock, which is the foundation of all soups.

"Stock must be frequently skimmed during the early stage of the proceedings. Never allow stock or soup to cool in the saucepan. The liquid should be poured off and strained into an earthenware bowl.

"The bones should be boiled for two or three hours and all the fat removed before the vegetables are added, which should be simmered until tender.

Do not overboil soup, as this spoils the flavor.
