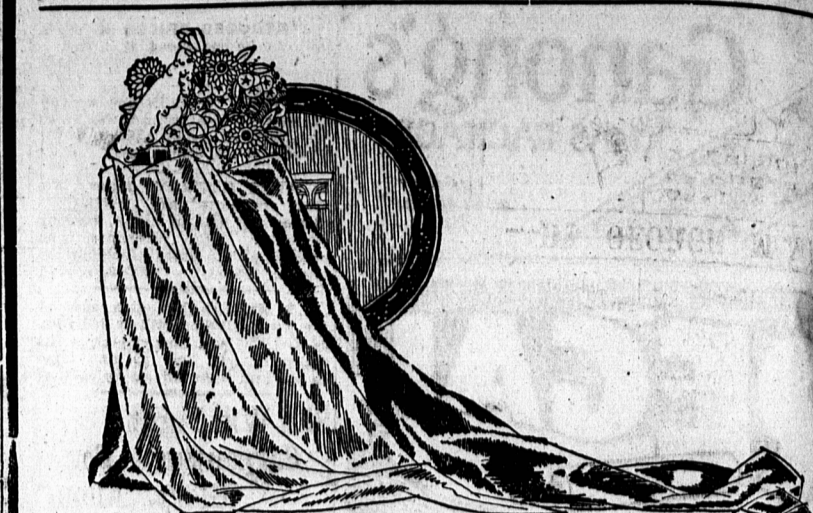

**CLEMENCEAU HONORED AT A STATE LUNCHEON**

WASHINGTON, Dec. 12.—The United States government today officially honored Georges Clemenceau. At a state luncheon, and as guest of President Harding at the White House, the French war premier sat with the highest officials of the administrative and legislative branches of the government. The vice president, the chief justice of the supreme court, seven cabinet members, house and senate leaders, and ranking officers of the army and navy all combined to honor him.
