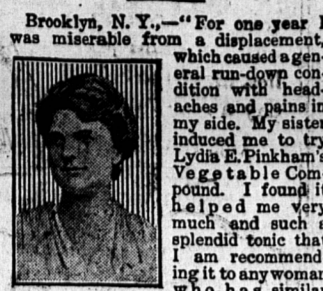

ANOTHER SON WOUNDED.—Mrs. J. T. Clarkin of this city, Saturday received a telegram conveying the sad news that her son Pte. Leo Patrick Clarkin of the Engineers had been admitted to No. 11 Stationary Hospital, Rouen, on August 9, suffering from gun shot wounds in the right arm and leg. This news is all the more regretted in view of the fact that Mrs. Clarkin, who is the widow of the late Prof. J. T. Clarkin, has already suffered exceptionally by reason of the war, having lost one son, Reginald, who was in the Navy and whose ship was torpedoed off Norway about six months ago. Another son, John, who went away with the first contingent was also seriously wounded and is still in hospital in England undergoing treatment. Leo, who is now wounded enlisted two years ago.

DEATH OF MRS. CROSKILL.—Mr. Gerald Bremner, city, received a wire Saturday conveying the sad news of the death in Somerville, Mass., of Mrs. W. H. Croskill, who passed away that same morning. The sad news will be received with deep regret by her many friends here. Deceased, whose maiden name was Jennie Malcolm, came here from Boston when a girl, and prior to her marriage lived here with her aunt, the late Mrs. John McEachern. Her father belonged to a well known old Halifax family. Mrs. Croskill, since the death of her husband, who for many years was librarian of the Dodd Library and Court Stenographer, lived for a time in Toronto, where she held a position at Haverhill College. She came home in March last upon the death of her son, Arthur, and soon after that sad event went to Boston to reside. There are left to mourn the following children: Mrs. Gerald Bremner, and Miss Evelyn, of this city, and one son, Jack, with the Canadian army in France; also one sister, Mrs. Arthur Newbery, of this city, and two brothers, Robert and Arthur in the United States. To all of these the sympathy of many is extended in their bereavement.

ANOTHER ISLANDER WOUNDED.—Mr. F. W. Hughes, City, has received a telegram stating that his son, W.S. Hughes, was admitted to No. 1 Birmingham Hospital, with gunshot wounds in the arm and side. Private Hughes was teaching school in Edmonton when the war broke out, and enlisted at once, and was one of the first to land in France from Canada. He has been there ever since. He has taken part in most of the principal battles and was shell-shocked on June 13, 1916. It is to be hoped his wounds are not of a serious nature.

S. S. CONVENTION AND GIRLS' CONFERENCE

A meeting was held on Friday evening in the Y.M.C.A. of those interested in the forthcoming Provincial Sunday School Convention. The various Sunday schools of the city are to appoint representatives to act as a general committee of arrangements.

There are to be sub-committees on Entertainment, Reception of Delegates, Sunday School Parade, Finance, Music, etc.

The convention proper will run from Monday noon, October 14th, to the evening of the 15th. On Sunday afternoon, October 13th it is planned to have a monster parade of all the Sunday school pupils of the city and a mass meeting of all the Sunday schools to be addressed by the noted convention speakers who are to be in the city at that time. Among these speakers will be Mr. Marion Lawrence, Chicago, general secretary of the International Sunday School Association, Dr. J. C. Robertson, Toronto, general secretary of the Presbyterian S. S. Board, and Miss Winnifred Thomas, Toronto, National Y.W.C.A. girls' worker.

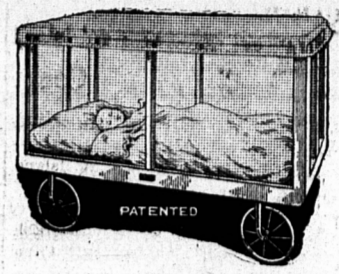
The music of the convention will be in charge of the famous musician composer of sacred songs, Director of music, Mr. E. O. Excell, of Chicago. Mr. Excell will be accompanied by Mr. Alvin W. Roper, the noted pianist.

It is hoped that a choir of at least 100 voices will be arranged from the singers of the city to lead the convention chorus work, on Sunday afternoon and at the evening sessions. Entertainment for the convention will be on the Harvard plan, that is, bed and breakfast will be provided free, commencing Monday, and arrangements will be made for providing supper for delegates at a reasonable rate. The Sunday meeting is designed chiefly as a city rally but Sunday school workers from outside will be welcomed, provided they arrange for their own entertainment.

It was further agreed to hold in Charlottetown on October 4th to 6th the first Older Girls' Work Conference. This will be similar in purpose and arrangement to the Boys' Work Conferences held during the past four years. A co-operative committee representing the city churches and the Y.W.C.A. will make the necessary local arrangements. On account of the fact that Charlottetown is entertaining the Presbyterian Synod and the Provincial S. S. Convention in October the conference will be planned for the older girls (fifteen

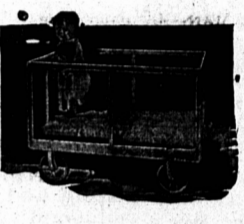

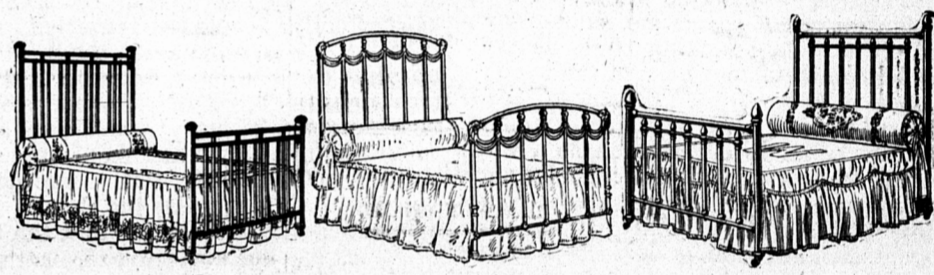

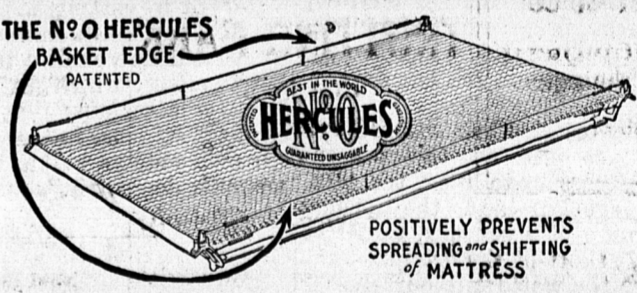
