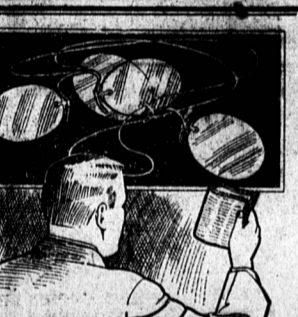

BIZZARD DOES SOME DAMAGE IN CITY'S ENVIRONS

MONTREAL, Feb. 10.—The miniature blizzard which swept across the city and surrounding country on Saturday night was responsible for considerable minor damage in various quarters, but no accident of any serious consequence was reported. Early on Saturday morning, about 40 feet of the roof of the power house of the Montreal Light, Heat and Power Company at Lachine Rapids was swept off by the high wind, but the portion affected was in a part of the plant which caused no interference with work at the power house and resulted in no interruption of the service of the company. Leonidas Chauvin was the hero of the narrowest escape reported during the storm. He was a passenger from St. Hilaire to Ste. Madeleine and was passing from one car to another on the train when a sudden squall came sweeping across the icy fields by the side of the track and lifted Chauvin off his feet, hurling him off the platform into a snow-bank. Although the train was making good speed at the time he was unhurt.

MELNITE INVENTOR DISCOVERS POWDER EVEN MORE STRONG

PARIS, Feb. 7.—A report that Turpin, the inventor of Melnite, has discovered trinitrotoluene, an even more powerful explosive, took a correspondent to Turin to interview him. Turpin explained that the report was true, but that the new explosive was discovered two years ago. Under various names, such as toluite and trotyl, it has been used everywhere in France. The new creation, Turpin said, is a stable, smokeless powder. It does not contain nitre or cellulose, and there are no changes up to a temperature of 115 degrees centigrade. There is no danger of spontaneous combustion until the temperature reaches 350 degrees. Turpin refuses to communicate the formula of his discovery to the government lest he be robbed of the fruit of his labors, as he was for melnite.

"It was our intention," he added, "to help as many of the men as possible, and so we offered work at other jobs to as many as we could employ. "It would pay us better to keep the shops closed until there is a general improvement of trade conditions, and if the men do not want to work the loss is theirs, and not ours at all. We were merely trying to do something for them."
