U. S. Reducing Forces in Cuba.

It is understood to be the purpose of the United States War Department in carrying out its already announced policy of reducing the forces of American troops in Cuba to begin within six weeks the reduction of the present force of 9,000 men to about 5,000, which limit will be reached by the beginning of summer. The proposition is under consideration to organize three complete Cuban regiments, with Cuban officers to replace the United States troops in garrison, and to form the nucleus of the Cuban army, which would exist when the island passes from the United States control.

Women Fight.

The London correspondent of the Liverpool Post understands that Dr. Leyds is beginning to prepare the European mind for the extraordinary spectacle of an Amazonian army on the side of the Boers. A report is current that the Transvaal agent writing to a correspondent in this country, had stated that the moment the British troops get a substantial footing in Boer territory the women intend to take up arms by the side of the burghers. It is stated that President Kruger has already found great difficulty in restraining those Amazons, but that both he and Jonbert have promised that in the last resort they will be permitted to take the field. Kruger is further credited by his enterprising agent on the Continent with the threat that only by the extermination of his race man, woman and child--will the British ever succeed in reaching Pretoria.

Hints on Roasting Chickens.

Presuming that the butcher has properly

cleaned the birds, wash them thoroughly, wipe dry inside and out; rub with salt and put an onion into the cavity. Stuff the breast through the neck with down the skin or fasten it with a skewer. Fill the body with stuffing, sew up the rent, cross the legs, and together, draw them down and rub with flour and put water enough to baking pan to bake the birds as that makes them juicy and tender.

First lay the chickens on their sides the baking pan and lastly on their backs that every part may be equally roasted and come to the table plump and juicy.

While cooking, preparations of gravy may go on. Boil the giblets they have been thoroughly cleaned, chop them fine. After the chickens are removed, pour into the baking pan water in which the giblets were boiled, the chopped meat and flour which has been mixed to a smooth paste, and just enough to thicken properly. Boil up once, then season to taste.
