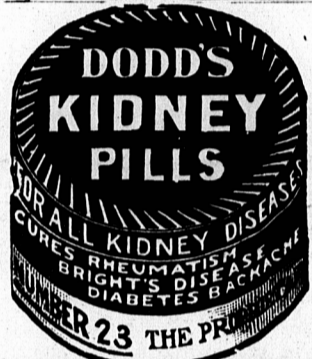
TEA PARTY

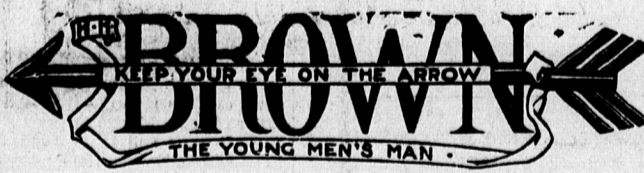
