GERMAN CRUISERS OFF ST. PIERRE

SYDNEY, Aug. 3.—Two German cruisers were sighted today off St. Pierre. They are probably from Mexican or West Indian waters. The surmised object of their presence so near Sydney Harbor is to secure coal for Transatlantic voyage, or they have been detailed to watch this port at the entrance of the St. Lawrence.
