The Baker, which is to take the place of the Halifax on the Plant route for the remainder of the winter will be due here Wednesday morning with passengers and cargo.—Halifax Chronicle.

D. P. MAXWELL, who has charge of a G. T. P. survey party, is at the Royal Bay returned from Summerside, where he spent the Christmas holidays with his family. Mr. Maxwell is exploring the region between Plaster Rock and the Miandich river. He says there is comparatively little snow in the woods, but expects before long to have to use snow shoes. The trip from Georgetown to Pictou was made in about three hours, and there was very little floating ice encountered.—St. John Star.

The Patriot of last evening states that The Guardian "insinuates, but does not openly charge that The Patriot has committed wholesale plagiarism and appropriated The Guardian's despatches." We again positively charge that The Patriot copied from The Guardian, word for word, letter for letter, typographical error and all, nearly their entire telegraphic news of Wednesday last and further in an endeavor to deceive their readers marked the stolen telegrams in bold letters "Special to The Patriot." Such a brazen-faced newspaper theft has undoubtedly never been committed by a reputable Canadian newspaper and the fact that frequently in the past has the same thing been done by The Patriot makes it all the more reprehensible. The reference to identical local news sent for publication to both papers, and other news which The Patriot states was copied from its columns is absolutely untrue in every particular.

Of the Ramblers which the Abegweits have challenged for the Starr trophy emblematic of the Maritime hockey championship. The Halifax Chronicle says The Ramblers Amateur Athletic Club are in good shape for the winter's key. In August last they were incorporated as a joint stock concern with a capital of \$10,000. They purchased the Aberdeen Rink and have thoroughly remodelled it giving them one of the finest rinks in the Province. They removed the end entrances and dressing rooms—building wings on each side for this purpose. This gives them about sixteen feet additional length, placing their rink fully up to the regular length. Their ice space is now 138x70 feet. The sides are screened with wire netting protecting the onlookers. Raised seats on each side and at the upper flat give a seating capacity to over 2000. Victor G. Curry is president of the Joint Stock Company, A. H. Lamy, managing director. F. J. T. McDonald, Secy-Treas. The team which last season was the champion of the Nova Scotia Amateur Hockey League and successful defenders of the Starr Trophy are probably as strong this season as last and judging from their work at practice will give a good account of themselves.
