

Recruits Wanted for Artillery Unit for Oversea Service

It is proposed to offer a composite battery of Heavy Artillery from Prince Edward Island for service in Europe—the Battery to be composed of members of the P.E. Island Heavy Brigade, Charlottetown, and the Thirty-seventh Field Battery of Montague and Souris. A number of officers, non-commissioned officers and gunners have already volunteered, but to bring the batteries up to war strength and to also form an ammunition column it will be necessary to secure upwards of one hundred recruits in addition to those who have already volunteered. Applications will be taken from recruits with or without military experience, as it is the expectation that sufficient drill will be given the Battery before proceeding to the front to make each member efficient. As soon as sufficient volunteers have handed in their names the proposed Battery will be submitted to headquarters for approval. It is hoped that the required number of men will come forward quickly.

GERMANS RUN SHORT OF ANAESTHETICS

NEW YORK, Nov. 14.—A cable from London to the Tribune says: "Besides the shortage of anaesthetics, already reported, there is considerable lack of lead in Germany, according to Dr. E. K. Johnstone, of San Francisco, an officer in the Medical Corps who has just returned from Belgium."

"There is no doubt that supplies of lead are running low in Germany, owing to the stoppage of the mines in Galicia and Silesia," said Dr. Johnstone. "A few days before I left Berlin a secret order was issued calling upon the music stores to turn over to the government all lead in pianos and other musical instruments in which that metal is used."

"This demand, which, of course, is being rigorously enforced, has aroused feelings of the deepest dejection in the music trade, which foresees an immediate ruin to itself."

"The shortage of anaesthetics is due chiefly, I think, to the German Medical staff's belief that it could readily replenish its supply from captured French and Belgian medical stores, and as Germany does not produce the basic ingredients of ether or chloroform the Red Cross is in bad shape in this respect."

ECONOMIC EPIGRAM

GOLDEN JUBILEE AT MISCOUCHE

1864 was replete with many historical facts. In 1864 the Fathers of Confederation met in Charlottetown and there laid the foundations of this great Confederation known as the Dominion of Canada.

In 1864 the Rev. Camille Lefevre, a saintly and holy priest, in answer to the call of the Rev. Pastor of Miscouche, left Montreal with the Rt. Rev. John Sweeney, Bishop of St. John, and founded in the Valley of Memromcook the beautiful and stately university known as the University of St. Joseph's College. In 1864 Mary Antoinette, spiritual daughter of the venerable "Angers" Barre, left Miscouche in company with two other sisters and arrived in the beautiful and thriving village of Miscouche amid a people martyr to their faith and loyal to their tongue. Her mission was to transport a Christian education to the young daughters of the numerous obstacles that befel in her way, her mission was crowned with unending glory.

It was therefore fitting that such an event should not pass unobserved. In answer to the call of the Rev. Pastor of Miscouche, the following clergyman wended their way towards Miscouche on Tuesday evening: viz. Rt. Rev. H. J. O'Leary, Bishop of Charlottetown; Very Rev. D. J. Gillis, Very Rev. J. C. McLean, Rev. J. B. McDonald, Rev. S. Bandreault, Rev. F. H. Gallant, Rev. J. A. McDonald, Rev. P. Arsenault, Rev. P. P. Arsenault, Rev. P. McDonald, Rev. Maurice McDonald, Rev. Maziere Puriel.

A well filled and elaborate programme was rendered by the pupils of the Convent and the ability with which their different items were rendered testified to the efficiency of the education received in this institution. Several addresses were read and accompanied by well filled purses, namely: Miscouche, Wellington and Grand River. The clergy heretofore named presented the Convent a beautiful gold chalice.

A pleasant feature of the celebration was the presence of pupils of fifty years ago, among whom Rev. Sister Regina, of Bouctouche, Mrs. Caline Gallant, of Shediac, Mrs. Andre Poirier, of Shediac, Mrs. Dr. Leger, of Miscouche, and others. On Wednesday morning High Mass was celebrated by Rev. R. B. McDonald, of Souris, having as deacon Rev. F. H. Gallant and sub-deacon, Rev. Maziere Poirier, Rev. P. P. Arsenault acting as master of ceremonies. Two elegant and appropriate sermons were given by Rev. S. Bandreault and Rev. John A. McDonald. On the whole, the festive days were all that could be desired. As a matter of history, Miscouche Convent, apart from St. Ann's School, Charlottetown, was the first Catholic institution to open to impart a Christian education to the young ladies of the Province. The founder of this institution was the Rev. Father Quevillan, of sacred memory. Realizing the great need of such an institution, he appealed, "a la messe" Française de Paris, through the influence he received a sufficient amount of money to erect the present building. Others followed in his footsteps, among whom were the Rev. R. B. McDonald, who for ten years labored strenuously in the vineyard of the Lord. After his death the convent was happily Rev. Maziere Bandreault. Then came Rev. John A. McDonald, who, during fifteen years worked zealously in the interest of the Convent. On the scene next came the Rev. John P. McGrath, called to his eternal reward before he had time to give expression to his zeal and devotedness. To him succeeds the Rev. Martin Monaghan, who during ten years has always been a true and faithful friend of the institution. May Miscouche Convent live long to continue the good work already so well begun and may her diamond jubilee gather to her bosom the numberless young ladies to whom she has so devotedly and loyally imparted the principles of a good and Christian education.—R.

EMPEROR URGES HIS TROOPS TO PREPARE FOR RUSSIAN INVASION

LONDON, Nov. 14.—(2.05 a. m.)—A Petrograd despatch to the Daily Telegraph sends the following order alleged to have been issued by the German Emperor to his troops in East Prussia:—

"My dear and faithful soldiers: Thanks to your valor France has been severely punished and Belgium has been added to the glorious provinces of Germany. You know also that our punitive expedition into Russia has been a brilliant success."

"But now we must turn to the new task of protecting our hearths, which moribund France and barbarous Russia are preparing to attack. Henceforward our military operation will take a new form which will soon be intelligible to you, my dear soldiers."

"Your trial has come—for you and all Germany. It is necessary to concentrate our energies on the repulse of our enemies, for otherwise, they aim to transform our free country into an enslaved and degraded province of Russia and France."

"If Germany is dear to you; if the culture and faith of the nation and Emperor are dear to you, you will offer the enemy a worthy resistance. Do not make a single step backward into our country. Remember that behind us, destruction threatens; it is only before us that happiness lies. For country, for glory, forward, faithful friends."

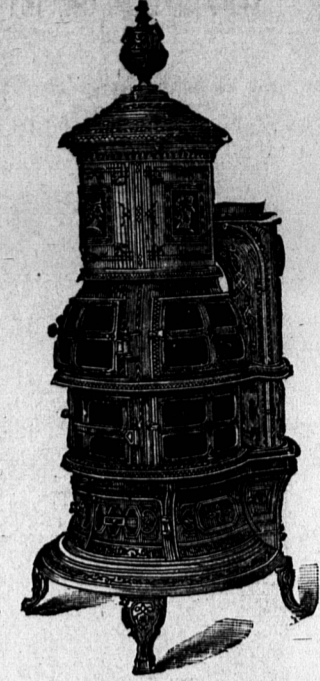
