**FILLY WINS KENTUCKY DERBY ONCE IN FIFTY-THREE SEASONS**

NEW YORK, April 16.—Kentucky Derby time is growing closer and closer and racing fans everywhere are clamoring about the big gallop. Will 1927, as so many others have been in the past, be a jinx year for fillies? In the 53 years' history of the event only one miss has romped under the judge's stand first. That fortunate little lady was Regret, daughter of Brantford and Jersey Lightning and great-granddaughter of the distaff side of Modesty, winner of the first American Derby at Chicago. Regret's victorious silks fluttered in the sunshine of 1915. It is probable that none of the score of fillies recently named for this year's Derby will get much consideration in the betting before May 14.

**EASILY POSSIBLE**

Still it is easily possible that one of them may win. The two-year-old racing of last season was not characterized by the development of an outstanding star. There were some crackerjack fillies, however, in Fair Star, Bonnie Maginn, Lodina, Candy Queen and Termagant. Then there are Bit o'White and Painted Lady, who are capable of better showings.

James Rowe declared last spring when Pandora, Pantella and Bonnie Pennant were beating smart colts on Long Island courses that racing

**Basketball Rules Will be Revised In 1927-28 Rule Book**

NEW YORK, April 16.—The teams. Represented on the joint basketball rules committee in annual session here last week, made a drastic change in the amateur rules by restricting the dribble to a single bound. The number of bounds had been unlimited. Officials of the committee said the change was adopted to eliminate roughness and to encourage team play. "Seventy per cent of fouls and violations of the rules have resulted from the dribble," declared Oswald Tower, Andover, Mass., editor of the official guide, in making the announcement. He said that basketball "is essentially a team game," and restriction of the dribble would reduce the element of individual play and encourage passing.

The change was adopted unanimously by the committee after three hours of discussion. It goes into effect with the new season and applies to all amateur

Hooley Smith, aggressive right winger of the champion Ottawa Senators, has been suspended for one calendar month. His suspension to start at the first of next season and follows as a result of his attack on Speedy Oliver Boston right wing player, in the last minute of the final game of the title series. Both these players have been fined \$100 each also.

**BABE RUTH**

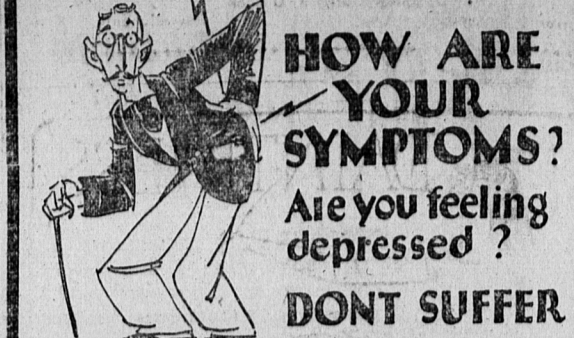
