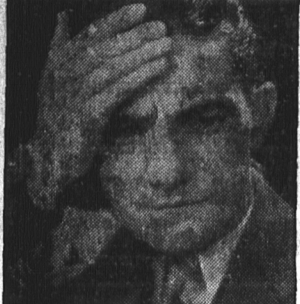

Urges Discussion Of Marriage Problems In High Schools

WINNIPEG, April 14 (CP)—High school students in the high-grades should be given an opportunity to discuss the problems of courtship and marriage, Miss Clara M. Brown, professor of Home Economics at the University of Minnesota, Minneapolis, told the Manitoba Educational Association in convention here today. "When they have been able, within the walls of the school to discuss frankly and without emotion, what it costs a family to live and the relative advantages of a larger income when the wife works and the simpler way of living with the wife as a homemaker when both sexes can learn about the rearing of children so they will not have conflicting ideas about how to handle them—then we may expect to have happier homes and fewer problem children," she said.

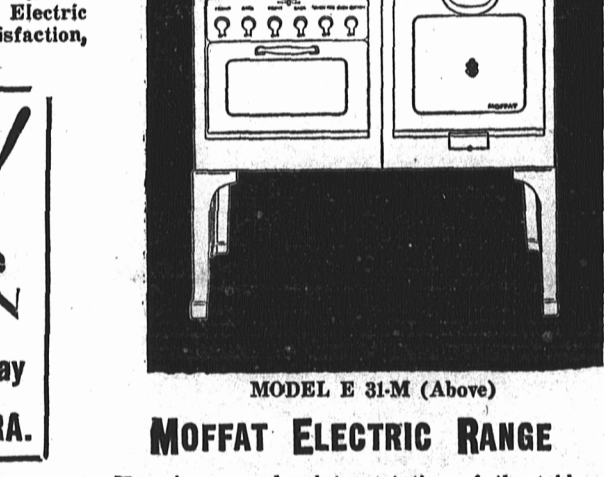

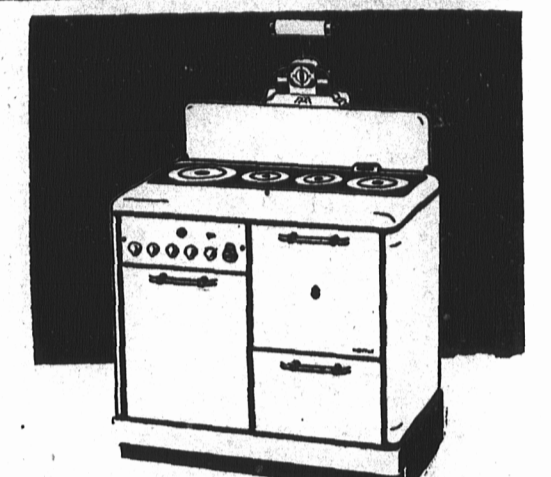

Col. M. D. MacKeigan Dies At Halifax. HALIFAX, April 13—Colonel Murdoch D. MacKeigan who won the Croix de Guerre during the Great War, died in hospital here today after a brief illness. He was 68. A native of Coxheath, N. S., he went to France as officer commanding "A" Company of the Nova Scotia Forestry Battalion in June, 1918. After the war he received his commission and in 1921 was placed on the reserve of officers. He had been station master for the Canadian National Railways at Pictou, N. S., since 1922 and was one of the leaders in yachting activities along Northumberland Strait. At one time he was president of the Sydney, N. S., branch of the Canadian Legion.
