AIRPLANE OVER PICTOU.—Newspaper delivery by airplane was made for the first time in Eastern Canada last Saturday when copies of The Atlantic Leader were dropped in the towns of Pictou, Westville, Stellarton, New Glasgow, Trenton and Thorburn. Delivery was made by an airplane from the Devere Aviation school, Trenton. Captain Laurie Stevens, of the school on his return from the Pictou county towns, said: "If Halifax had a proper aerodrome we could inaugurate a service that would distribute the Halifax papers all over the province early in the day. We could deliver them in St. John and Charlottetown long before noon and in Montreal the day they are issued." The greatest excitement prevailed in Pictou county whose people had never before been visited by an airplane, and the arrival of the novel delivery machine was awaited with tense interest.

BANDITS STRIP VAULT IN BANK IN BROAD DAYLIGHT

RANDOLPH, Mass., Nov. 17.—The Randolph Savings Bank was raided today by four armed men, who bound Treasurer N. Irving Tolman, a woman clerk and a customer, stripped the vault of bonds, cash and valuables estimated at \$40,000 to \$50,000, and fled in an automobile in which they had come. They left no clue except the automobile registry number, which is assigned to a man at Greenfield. It was learned tonight that the number plates were still in place of this man's car, which was in his garage today, and it is supposed that the robbers carried a forged number plate. The men were of foreign extraction, Treasurer Tolman said.

Depositors are protected against the loss, according to the treasurer. Part of the booty was in Liberty Bonds, some of it was in cash. Valuables placed in deposit by customers also were robbed by the men from various drawers of the vault.

It was within a few minutes of closing time this afternoon, Mr. Tolman said, when two young men entered the bank lobby. One asked for a pen, and both started to write at a desk. The treasurer noticed nothing peculiar about that at the time. Two other men entered the bank a few minutes just after the last remaining customers had gone.

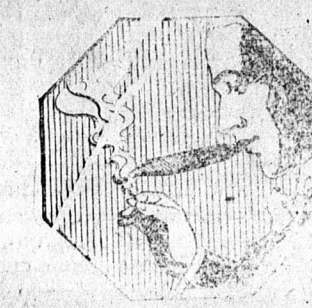

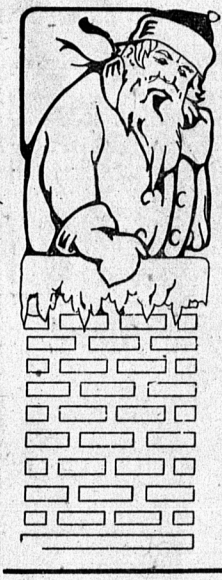

In Fifteen Minutes With their appearance one of the men at the desk vaulted the railing and with revolver extended ordered Treasurer Tolman to throw up his hands. Another pinned Miss Francis Howard, a clerk, to the wall, stopping her mouth with his hands, and the other two were over the railing and at the vault in a moment. The treasurer and clerk were bound and surging men were pasted over their mouths. While the bandits were at work George Glidden, a customer of the bank entered and was confronted by a man with a revolver. He too was bound and gagged, and tied with the treasurer. They were thrown to the floor in the rear of the office and covered with coats taken from the walls. One of the men, Treasurer Tolman said, acted as leader and directed the operations. He was said, except to demand the treasurer's keys. The men showed no familiarity with the bank, but went about their work and had cleaned the vault within fifteen minutes. The leader then ordered one of the men to stand guard for five minutes and the other three men left. The sentry stayed a minute or two, then followed his companions in time, to accompany them in the automobile which they had left standing outside the bank door, with the motor running. The treasurer and his fellow prisoners attempted to wrench themselves clear of their bonds, but it was several minutes before Mr. Tolman freed his hands sufficiently to operate the burglar alarm. The gong, clanging outside the bank, brought persons nearby to the office and made possible the sending out of an alarm within fifteen minutes of the bandits' escape. Persons who had seen the automobile said it had headed toward Boston.
