Budget Debate Is Continued In Legislature

Mr. Saville resuming his debate on the budget and his purpose in speaking on Prohibition was not to discuss the amendment calling for a plebiscite...

He dealt with the administration of the Prohibition Act and traced the establishment of the law in this Province.

He declared that there never was a law on the statute books of the Province which came before the electors so often, and cited the many plebiscites which always resulted in the retention of the Prohibition Act.

During all the time the law has been in force it has never been repealed although beer and wine had often been advocated, he said.

Cause of Smuggling In the early days of the Prohibition, drug addicts and doctors were allowed to keep a certain amount of liquor on hand, he said.

The trouble now is that too many young people think they are sick and need a drink to get on with people who thought the issuing of doctors' prescriptions should be greatly curtailed.

He would not vote for taking the power of the doctor's hands to administer liquor to these people, but would not want to support any measure which would assist in the liquor traffic.

He appealed to the medical profession to use consideration when issuing prescriptions to young people.

Speaking of the enforcement of the Prohibition Law, he said that the health department by the Prohibition Commission, he had favored doing away with the commission as the Attorney General was responsible for the enforcement of the law.

The enforcement officers are also responsible, he continued, and public opinion must be behind the law to assist in enforcing it.

Women Blamed The women are blamed for having the Prohibition Law kept on the statute books, he said.

The matter of farm rehabilitation and the need for more Government cannot very well handle it at present when there is a war going on, Mr. Saville said.

Speaking of libraries, he said the library would receive another gift of art collections this year. The circulation record is probably a little less than the previous year.

The number of books in the library is 50,228, at present. He explained that the Carnegie Library grant was discontinued in 1936 and the Government has carried on the library at the minimum of expenditure.

The library has advanced and the number of volumes increased. Credit Unions Hon. Mr. McGulgan said there were 44 Credit Unions in this Province and they were steadily increasing.

He outlined the amount of business being done by the Credit Unions and advocated that the books of the Credit Unions should be gone over often by the auditor to guard against any losses.

In regard to Adult Education the speaker said that \$2,000 had been voted for this purpose during the past year. He spoke of the establishment of study clubs throughout the Province.

Hon. Mr. McGulgan said that the work in the Department of Public Health was increasing. A campaign against diphtheria was carried on during the year and many school children were inoculated.

A mild epidemic of scarlet fever visited the Province during the last of the year, he continued. He outlined the work done in connection with tuberculin skin tests.

The speaker said that the grant from the insurance companies to the health department was stopped and a cut in salaries was put into effect and about \$12,000 was saved in four years.

He agreed with the leader of the Opposition when he made the statement that more money should be spent in the Health Department, and spoke of the importance of safeguarding the health of the Province.

Pathologist Coming Plans to have a pathologist placed in the laboratory were made and \$15,000 will be granted by the Rockefeller Foundation. It is expected that the pathologist will be here in a few months, he said.

He mentioned the Provincial Sanatorium and the cost of it. Mr. McGulgan said, the cost of running the institution has increased. The rate of deaths from tuberculosis in the Province during 1939 was the lowest in history but it is still high when figured over a period of years.

Referring to a question regarding the number of doctors in the country districts, he said that the condition was improved as the number of doctors had increased.

Any doctors who were not carrying their own business and were not in the city, the scarcity of doctors in the country presents a great difficulty in the winter.

Old Age Pensions The department of old age pensions is large and it will increase in the next few years, the speaker said. There were more than 10,000 at the end of the year last year there were 1983 old age pensioners.

The Dominion Government supply 75 per cent of the amount and are very strict in their regulations, he concluded.
