"THE BISHOP MURDER CASE"
 PACKED WITH SUSPENSE, SHOCKS AND SURPRISES

An adaptation of S. S. Van Dine's best seller, "The Bishop Murder Case," is giving a lot of people a hair raising good time at the Prince Edward Theatre as a result of a cleverly contrived story and convincing portrayals by such prominent cinema favorites as Basil Rathbone, Lella Hyams, Roland Young, Alec. B. Francis, George Marion and Zelda Sears.

Nick Grinde and David Burton, jointly responsible for the direction of the all-talking thriller, have done a superb job with good material, for there is never a lag in the suspense and action of the exciting Van Dine story which starts off with making you suspect three men as being involved in the murder of "Cook Robin" but fools you in having the three men themselves killed off by the mysterious "bishop."

What distinguishes this Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer production from other mystery plays is that it spurns the use of such obvious devices as the finding of cigarette butts of the same brand as those used by a suspect; forged fingerprints; the dog that does not bark and thereby reveals that the intruder is familiar; the final planning of the murder on a twin or double of the suspect. Among the original ideas in the film is the finding of a black chess bishop at the side of each of the victims together with a jeering note couched in "Mother Goose" rhyme.

Rathbone, as the detective Philo Vance, gives an entirely believable portrayal; Miss Hyams, as capable actress as she is beautiful, has the leading feminine role of Belle Dillard; Young, fresh from "Unholy Night" gives another of his inimitable performances. The remaining

members of a large cast live up to the precedent set by the principals. "The Bishop Murder Case" may well be recommended as the best of its type of photoplay produced thus far this season.

So keep 'em way up, Jack. Phil may not feel 'em, but you can bet that the vigilant Jimmy Johnston will see 'em.

The Kensington Cape Traverse Play-Off Game

On Friday evening, February 21st, the Cape Traverse Bloodhounds were led to Kensington by Coach Mulligan to meet the Granites in the first game to decide the winners of the Eastern and Central sections of Prince County in the race for the McLean Trophy. The game, which ended in a 3-3 deadlock, kept the spectators continually in an uproar, and it was the general consensus of opinion that it was superior to any yet played in the new rink.

From the opening bell the Bloodhounds were distinctly on the scent bewildering their opponents for a time by unlooked-for speed and superb teamwork. After five minutes of excellent hockey Claude McWilliams stellar right winger for the Hounds, scored on a solo run and number two was netted six minutes later by Wendell McWilliams on a wicked drive from the Granites' blue line. Capt. Claude Howatt of the Bloodhounds, who was playing a brilliant game, now erected a three-man defence which effectively resisted the many spectacular solo rushes hurled at it by the Kensington sextette for the remainder of this period, which ended with Mulligan's marksmen nursing a two goal lead.

At the face off in the second period the play was unusually fast and even, each team combining together like hot dogs and mustard. Cleverly executed plays and skillful stick-handling were much in evidence on both sides and the proverbial edge was missing. D. Murphy grabbed a loose puck near the Bloodhound kennel and the flashing of the red light gladdened the hearts of the home fans. The remainder of the period was thrilling but scoreless ending 2-1 in favor of the visitors.

Late Market News

(Canadian Press)

MONTREAL, Feb. 24.—(Production)— A definitely easier tone was noted on the local butter market today, with New Zealand being quoted as low as 34 1/2 cents, although 35 cents a pound was the average. Some 500 cases of New Zealand butter arrived here today. Prices to the retail trade remained unchanged at 38 and 39 cents a pound. The cheese market remained extremely quiet with prices at 19 cents for easterns and 19 1/2 cents for westerns continuing to prevail. Reductions continued to take place on the egg markets with averaged 1 cent a dozen today on all grades prices now ranging from 36 to 49 cents a dozen. The dressed poultry market remained unchanged. The local potato market displayed somewhat easier trend reflecting a somewhat diminished demand. New Brunswick green mountains were quoted at \$1.60 to \$1.65 per 90 pounds in bulk and Quebec's at \$1.60.

OTTAWA, Ont., Feb. 24.— Lower prices and a generally weak market are reported from practically all Canadian centers today. Toronto 24 there has been a further sharp break in egg prices here. Dealers are now quoting country shippers for ungraded eggs extras 37-38 cents, firsts 34-35 cents, pullet extras 33-34 cents, seconds 30-32 cents, delivered, cases returned. Wholesale prices to retailers are extras 42 cents, firsts 40 cents, pullet extras 38 cents, seconds 35 cents. Montreal. Egg receipts here Saturday were 2,594 cases as compared with 1,908 cases on the corresponding day last year. The market is very quiet and lower. U. S. fresh eggs are jobbing between dealers at extras 42 cents, firsts 39 cents, seconds 35-36 cents. Wholesalers are selling to retail stores extras 44-46 cents, firsts 42-43 cents, seconds 37-41 cents. Winnipeg. Egg receipts here are showing some increase and effective today. Wholesale are reducing the quotations to country shippers to extras 40 cents, firsts 37 cents, seconds 30 cents, delivered, cases returned. Vancouver. This egg market is steady, but working lower under heavier supplies of eggs.

DOINGS AT THE NAVAL PARLEY

(Special to the Guardian)

PARIS, Feb. 22.—The new French Government which when formed will send a new delegation to the London Naval Conference, will probably differ from the previous Government in naval policy, only in small degree if at all. It is the left more than the right which, since Washington conference has taken the initiative in building up the French navy. Despite the present international crisis the entire nation seems well satisfied with the conduct by ex Premier Andre Tardieu and Aristide Briand, Foreign Minister and will continue at London appears certain that whoever finally becomes the Prime Minister, M. WILDCATS ARE OFF ON TOUR

KENTVILLE, N. S., Feb. 24.—The Wildcats left Kentville Monday morning for Lunenburg, where they will meet the Halifax Wolverines the same evening in the opening game of a tour, during which they will play teams in Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, the Provinces of Quebec and Boston. The itinerary is all complete, with the exception of the Quebec games. Owing to play-offs in that province it has not yet been definitely settled whether the Wildcats will play in Quebec City, Montreal, or Sherbrooke. That games will be arranged in two of these three cities is however, practically certain.

Coach Small stated this evening that the Wildcats schedule will be as follows:
