The publication in question, which is of international reputation and world wide circulation, is published in Glasgow, Scotland. Messrs Hyndman and Company, who are Lloyd's agents for the Province, feature Prince Edward Island in their advertisement as "The Tourist Resort of Eastern Canada" and solicit communications from any one seeking information concerning the province's "ports, its world famous silver black fox industry, seed potatoes, Government inspected cattle produced in this disease free area, dairy products, choice canned lobster and other native products." Such publicity methods on the part of an individual business concern shows not only initiative but public spirit in a commendable degree. The returns from such advertising cannot fail to benefit the Province, which incidentally is the only part of Canada to receive publicity in the issue of the Journal referred to.

**MANSION FOR FIVE SHILLINGS**  
 —Some time ago The Guardian published a news item to the effect that a mansion in Glasgow, Scotland, had been sold at auction for the ridiculous sum of five shillings. The item was such an extraordinary one that Mr. James Paton forwarded the clipping to his friend, Mr. Donaldson, of Glasgow, asking him if it could be verified. Mr. Donaldson's reply has been received, and confirms the story of the sale. The mansion in question, it appears, had been empty for some years. On the death of the owner the trustees offered it at £1,000 but had no bid. Then they tried it at £500, with the same result. The trouble was the high ground rent and the local taxes which came to a good deal over £156 per annum. Although the house was empty the owners had to pay all the rates and taxes. So the trustees, desirous of getting rid of it at any price, put up the house for sale without reserve. "We do not know whether the lady who bought it made the offer in a joke or not," writes Mr. Donaldson, but she is now in the house; though what use she will make of it we do not know. The house was in a fairly good condition in every way. These large mansion houses here are very difficult to sell at present." The writer mentioned two other large mansions which were offered to the Town Council at very low prices, but which the Council refused to buy.

**Uniform Companies Act For Provinces And The Dominion**  
 Designed For Protection Of Public, Uniformity Will Correct Abusive Situation In Canada—Action At Dominion-Provincial Conference.

**UNIFORMITY REQUIREMENTS**  
 Sometimes the proposed incorporators have had to pass from one province to another to get provincial incorporation. Complaints also have been made in the case of Dominion Companies who only require to register in a province to carry on.

Uniformity of the requirements and methods of incorporation in the Dominion and the nine provinces will be made to cope with this situation. When drafted, the legislation will be introduced in Parliament and all provincial legislatures.
