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British Players Defeat Yanks In Good Golf Meet

MISS MOLLY GOURLAY LEADS TEAM TO VICTORY BY DEFEATING MISS GLENNA COLLETT.

SUNNINGDALE, Eng., May 2.—In fifteen matches, five foursomes and ten singles, all featuring fine sportsmanship and good golf, Miss Molly Gourlay's British team today won from Miss Glenna Collett's United States lineup, eight matches to six, with one halved. The final score was 8 1-2-6-1-2.

The British women played a better all around game than did the visitors. They were steadier in the pinches and produced better shots generally with all clubs. However, the players from the United States made a most creditable showing on grounds that were unfamiliar to them.

Miss Gourlay's victory over Miss Collett was attained through stronger play at the finishing holes. Each had a medal round of 75 which was a tribute enough for their play over Sunningdale's 6,300 yards. Helen Hicks was puzzled on the putting greens all day. "She put me right off the greens," she said of her Scotch conqueror, Jean McCulloch.

The foursomes in the morning resulted in an even break each group winning two with one halved.

Stronger Demand For Millfeed

SACKVILLE, May 2.—The demand for millfeeds has been generally stronger this year in the Maritime Provinces. The recent stronger demand for bran and shorts has advanced prices. Not being in as large demand, middlings have declined. Trading will likely increase during the next week or two, due to thaws and bad roads for hauling in rural districts.

Large supplies of local oats in Prince Edward Island which are now moving to the mainland are having a tendency to reduce the movement of millfeeds. Supplies of feeding stuffs are reported to be ample throughout the Maritimes. The poultry feed trade has increased rapidly in the three provinces in recent years.

New Brunswick.—Western feed wheat, \$1.53 per bushel; local oats, 75 cents; oats, No. 2, C. W., 90 cents; oil cake meal, \$3.20 per 100 pounds; gluten feed, \$2.55; cottonseed meal, \$2.80; corn, \$2.25; fish meal, \$3.75; meat meal, \$4; bran \$38 per ton; shorts \$38; middlings, \$45; standard re-cleaned screenings, \$32.

To Do Away With Boxing Referees

PROVINCES FAVOR HOLDING OF BRITISH EMPIRE BOXING CHAMPIONSHIPS.

MONTREAL, May 2.—A suggestion to abolish referees in future in boxing bouts under the jurisdiction of the Canadian Boxing Federation and replace the official with a third judge was given the unanimous support of the Federation at a meeting here today. The innovation was not definitely ratified, however, but left to the incoming commission. The meeting also voted in favor of ratification of the tenders made by the British organization regarding the holding of British Empire boxing championships. It was announced that favorable replies had been received from the Premiers of Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and several other provinces to the letters asking consideration of the formation of Provincial Boxing Commissions.

The liquidators informed the exchange officials that they would continue the conduct of the firm's business, as an auditor's statement indicated the solvency of the Company.

Good-bye to nasty stories of nasty boys and girls who in the imagination of the usually middle-aged author do whatever they do nastily. Good-bye to all that, and to him too, for the boys and girls are getting old enough to write about themselves, and their reports are quite different.

Good-bye to books that solve every American problem by prosperity and confuse happiness with cleanliness and success with a full stomach and indigestion afterward. Good-bye also to the carpers on the other side who are determined to bite their nails and be gloomy.

Good-bye to everything ending with "st or ic."

Good-bye to the fictionalized biography, in which truth is made stranger than fiction and not half so convincing. Good-bye to a hundred such books written by industrious hacks because the patient public has turned toward biography. Good-bye to short stories written by formula and guaranteed to knock out your eye with the last paragraph. 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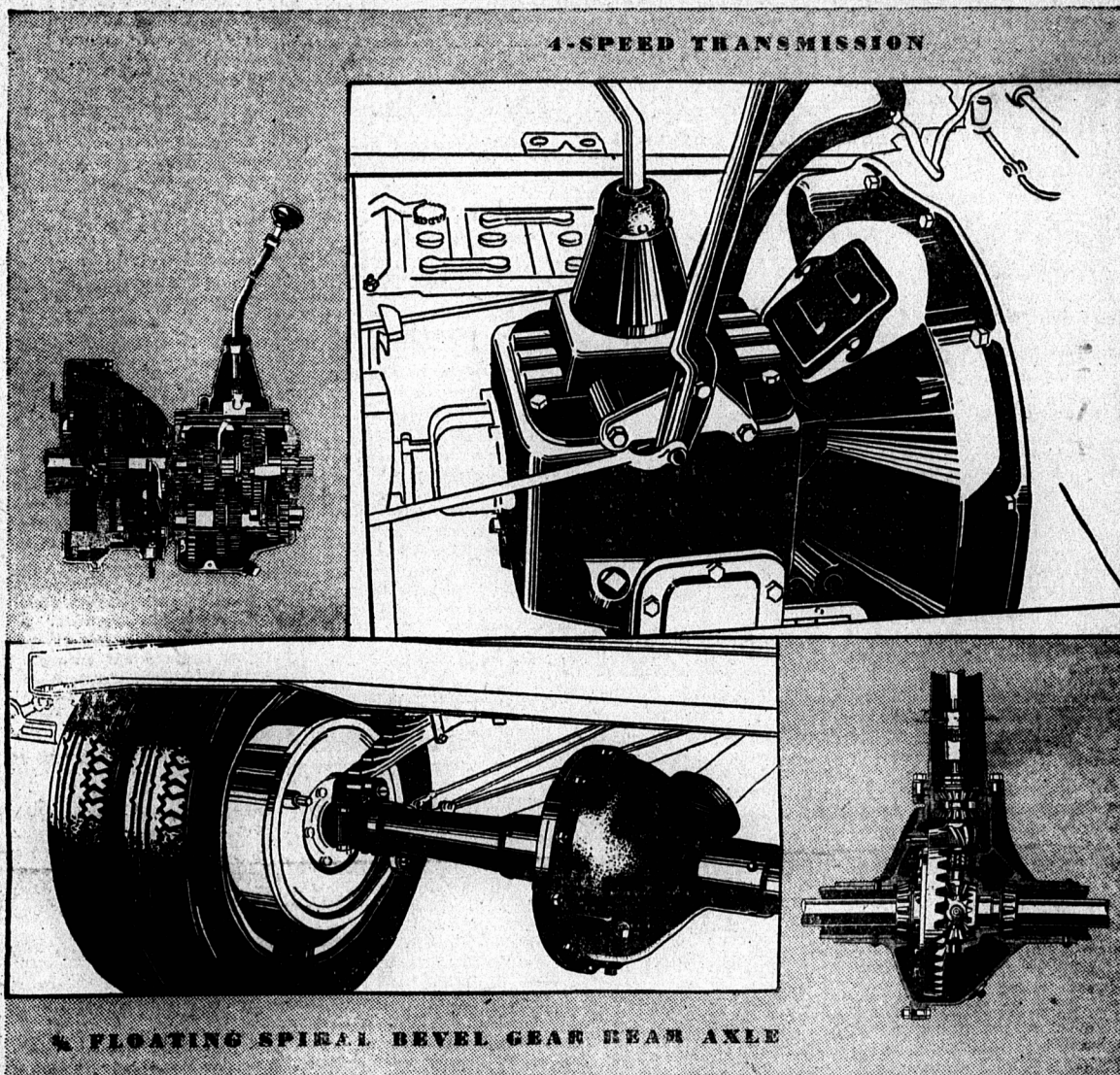
