The Northfield Convention.

At Northfield, Mass. from July 1-10, between five and six hundred young men representing the Young Men's Christian Association, of the various Colleges of Canada and the United States assembled in Conference under Dwight L. Moody.

A number of the best platform speakers in America including Rev R A Torrey, D D, of Chicago; Robert E Sperry, New York; Rev R P McKay, D D, of Toronto; Rev A T Pierson, D D, of East Northfield; Chancellor McDowell, of Denver University; Rev C J Schofield, Rev Edward Judson, D D, Rev Mr Zymer, I R G S, missionary in Arabia; President Strong, of Rochester Theological Seminary; Rev Mr Johnson, of Bristol, England, and others.

The names of the speakers would, themselves be a sufficient guarantee of the excellence of the addresses, but in every case the best thoughts of these leading men of thought were given.

Each evening at 8 o'clock on a small hill known as "The Hill" behind Mr Moody's home the services were delivered bringing before the minds of the large assembly of young men the opportunities for a "Life Investment" in the various fields of missionary activity.

The speakers with becoming words called attention to the great crying needs of the world for Christian workers.

Besides these addresses there was held each morning Missionary Institute Conference and Association work, and bible training classes.

A noticeable feature of the Convention was 4th of July celebration. Dr Torrey addressed the students in the morning on missionary work among the soldiers at Tampa and Chicomanga camps. After relating the great successes that were attending the labors of the missionaries he referred to two good results of the present war. (1) The complete re-union of the north and south. (2) The springing up of a faithfully spirit in the daughter towards the motherland. These expressions were enthusiastically received.

In the evening the auditorium presented a very pretty appearance being decked with the banners and colors of the colleges. The stars and stripes between two Union Jacks was stretched across the front.

The meeting was opened by singing the National Anthem of America and Great Britain, after which the whole audience joined in the chorus. So say all of us.

Then as the various colleges were engaged in giving their college songs and yeilding the portrait of President McKinley was unveiled and the balcony the whole house rose en masse and cheered to the echo. But in the midst of this excitement the Canadian delegation sang My Country 'tis of Thee, and the silence thus restored was again broken with vociferous cheers for Canada, Canada. This feeling of brotherhood between the delegates characterized the whole Convention.

The Conference will long be remembered for its depth of spirituality and power as well as the fellowship of so many young men with the one aim of seeking to deepen their own spiritual life and of preparing themselves more fully for working in the great harvest field for Christ.
