THE engravings of the portraits of Lord and Lady Minto, donated by their Excellencies to the City, have arrived and have been hung in the Council Chamber among the paintings of the late Mayors of the City.

DR. Anderson, Superintendent of Education visited the City schools yesterday to introduce the correspondence plan of the League of the Empire referred to in the editorial columns to-day. The children of the city schools who wish to do so hand in their names and correspondents in other parts of the Empire are allotted to them. The object of the scheme is to bring before the rising generation in the distant parts of the Empire the resources and possibilities of Canada and Prince Edward Island more particularly. This scheme was also in vogue several years ago during the time that Professor J. O. Arsenault was principal of the Model School.

THE WEST PROTESTS VIGOROUSLY.

SIR—I wish to enter the emphatic protest of the West against the intolerable practice of loading up its express at night with freight cars; and thus disgusting travellers, delaying trains and making their running extremely dangerous. Why we should be discriminated against in this matter we fail to understand. On Friday night, for example, the boat was on time, the mixed train from Charlottetown which is converted into our night express was on time at Summerside and notwithstanding all this we did not get away till long after the hour of departure because the thrifty management at the capital, instead of distributing its freight cars either by regular or special freighter inflicted ten empties on us—some to be put off at Miscouche, some at Port Hill, some at West Devon, etc. The desperate jolting and intolerable delays of this express freighter was voted an outrage by every man, woman and child on board. In striking contrast was the Charlottetown express which moved off on time and with no handicap. Why are we treated differently from others? Why are we incommoded, jolted to pieces, subjected to great danger for even unprofessionals can see that such trains are a crime against the rules of railroading, while our eastern friends have all the advantages the schedule promises. We have tolerated this thing long enough, it goes on night after night, and now cry a halt. Let those responsible learn their lesson quickly and effectively else we may have to do what we have done before in the West and know well how to do, to secure our incontestable rights.
