At the meeting of the cheese board held yesterday afternoon, eight factories boarded 1522 boxes of the last half of August cheese. Stanley Bridge sold 409 boxes at 11 3-16 to Mr. Bina; Lakeville 165 at 11 3-16 to Dillon & Spillet, and 11 1-4 was bid on Hazelbrook and refused. The buyers complain that some factories ship cheese in green and damp boxes, that rot the rind and gives the cheese a bad appearance when opened. It would be in the interest of the factories to see that the boxes are dry before putting cheese in them. The next meeting of the Board will be on Friday, Sept. 15th, at 11.30 a. m.
