Summary Action In Execution of Rebels Deported

MEXICO CITY, February 15. - Criticism of the "hasty and drastic" action of the court-martial which sentenced General Antonio Pruneda to death, which regarded the civil proceedings involved, is causing a delay of his trial. It is reported editorially by the Mexico newspapers this morning, to the effect that the government should employ firing squads to prevent further delay.

Without attempting to condone general Pruneda's acts, which led to the charge of conspiracy, the executive asserts that the prisoner has denied the ordinary guarantees, and was executed after the proper legal steps to obtain a stay of execution. The newspaper likewise deplors the "hasty" and "arbitrary" trial, in which even the authorities were barred from communication with the court-martial.

The Universal ally, makes no attempt to defend General Pruneda, as it deplors execution in general. Concluding its editorial remarks with the following: "Enough of blood. We thought that elements would always be a sign of strength."

MUCH COMMENT AROUSED. General Pruneda's execution yesterday has aroused no comment here. Any similar occurrence since the death of Carranza ordered Felipe Carranza and his associates to be executed. His will, however, well established, but his friends complain of the manner employed in the court-martial, which they believe as high handed, alleging that it even refused to admit to

its presence the representatives of the civil courts hearing orders for a delay of the trial. The government's friends, however, see in the summary action taken against Pruneda an evil precedent of President Obregon's intention not to tamper longer with those who are plotting to assassinate him. His recent stern stand, they claim, has strengthened his hold on the executive power.

LINE EAST STILL BLOCKED - Yesterday the snow fighters were busy on the eastern railway lines and it is expected that today all lines will be clear. On the Murray Harbor line from Vernon River to Charlottetown, the banks in some cuttings are twenty-five feet deep and the snow is being removed, while reducing the mass of snow has added greatly to the weight and it forms a solid barrier against the action of the plough. On the Georgetown line the track is still blocked to Mt. Stewart, and no train has come through since Thursday. Snow-fighting trains are working on both lines at each end and they hope to meet today. The Borden train arrived last night at 8.15.

SUPREME COURT. At the Supreme Court yesterday the case of the Charlottetown Milling Company vs. the Canadian-Fairbank Milling Co. was resumed. Counsel for the plaintiff submitted supplementary evidence including copies of Canada Gazette containing an Order-in-Council, dated February 11th, 1918, relative to the appointment of the Canada Food Board, and a report dated December 20th, 1919, respecting certain orders and regulations of the War Measure Act of 1914. Mr. Inman, K.C., then proposed to have for a non-suit on the ground that the company's incorporation cannot be held to obtain the benefit of a contract purporting to have been made by it, on its behalf, before the corporation came into existence. Mr. Inman then outlined the facts of the case and Mr. Justice K.C. replied in behalf of plaintiff. The Court adjourned to meet this morning.

After a dainty treat had been given by the teacher to the visitors and the pupils the singing of the National Anthem brought the proceedings of the afternoon to a close.

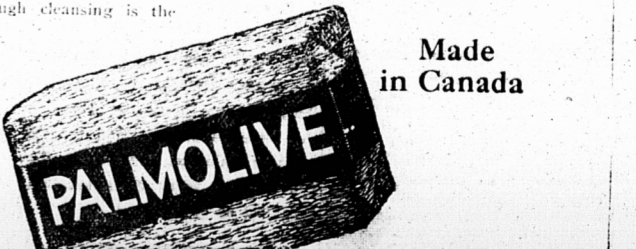
