**Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations**

THE sole head of a family or any male over eighteen years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency, but not Sub-Agency on certain conditions.

Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live with a wife and minor children on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section on alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre.

Duties—Six months residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also 50 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions.

A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$5.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$500.

The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of crop, scrubby or stony and. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.

suit of this object it was ascertained that a full and impartial enforcement of the Act did not receive the favour of those responsible for the enforcement of the people's will, but rather met with an apathy and indifference on their part which on numerous occasions amounted to open hostility. The Alliance then directed its attention towards laying before the people the extent to which the antagonism of governments and legislators had frustrated the enforcement of the law and the efforts of temperance workers. So effectively was this accomplished that at the time of our last meeting an Act was passed preventing such interference by officials and legislators by handing over the enforcement of the Prohibition Act to an independent Commission.

The Prohibition Commission which was appointed shortly after our last meeting found after a short experience that it was impossible to abolish the sale of liquor without more effective legislation for that purpose, and without the enactment of the amendments of the Prohibition Act which had been asked for by the Alliance.

The years of persistent and continuous effort and agitation by the Alliance for such legislation, and the demand of the Commissioners, resulted in the enactment at the session of the Legislature in March last, of an Act which in its general scope is one of the most stringent and effective prohibition laws in Canada.

The temperance workers of this province who have given so liberally of their time and money in the furtherance of this great cause have reason to congratulate themselves upon these results.

toxicating liquor is removed entirely from druggists and placed in the hands of vendors appointed by and subject to the inspection and control of the Commissioners, and the abuses heretofore existing in connection with the giving of prescriptions for medicinal purposes and with the sale of liquor by vendors has been sought to be remedied.

Many provisions for the better enforcement of the law which had been repeatedly asked for by the Alliance have been introduced in this measure.

Under the authority conferred by this statute vendors and inspectors have been appointed by the Commissioners and we would urge all members of the Alliance and all temperance workers to give every assistance to the Commissioners and the Inspectors in the carrying out of the provisions of this Act. We would advise our friends and workers in every community to get together and appoint an Advisory Temperance Committee for the purpose of procuring and furnishing to the Inspectors all available information as to violations of the Act.

We would respectfully call the attention of the Commissioners and of the Government to the fact that the provisions of section 52 of the Act which declares it unlawful for any person to keep or have in his possession any liquor unless such liquor has been purchased from a vendor in accordance with the provisions of the Act, have not yet been brought into operation.

We have reason to believe that very large stocks of liquors were imported previous to the time the Act came into force and are now stored in the province on the premises of liquor dealers and their friends. One lot of liquor amounting in value to about two thousand dollars has been seized by an Inspector within the past week and until section 52 is put in operation, grave doubts may arise as to the propriety of making any such seizures. We would ask that an Order in Council be passed at once so that the menace of the existence of these liquors in our midst may be removed.

We would also direct attention to the fact that offenders who have been many times convicted of offences which are classed as first offences against the Prohibition Law are now being convicted of offences which are classed as first offences only, and subjected to a fine of \$100 instead of imprisonment without the option of a fine. The payment by such offenders of minimum money fines as compensation for their continued violation of the Act in effect changes the Prohibition Law into a mere revenue-producing or license Act. The Alliance has for years protested against this method of procedure.

In the enforcement and interpretation of some of the provisions of this statute certain difficulties and differences of opinion have occurred. We have no doubt however that the Commissioners will cause these matters to be remedied at the earliest opportunity.

This report would be incomplete without reference to the death of our late friend, Mr. Richard C. Goff, who during his whole life was a consistent temperance worker. For years he was an active member of the Alliance a member of its Advisory Committee, and had filled the office of President. Mr. Goff's influence was ever on the side of temperance, and of the moral and social betterment of the community.

In conclusion we would repeat the recommendation of the Alliance in its
