## Cards Split With Phils To Take Over Lead In National League

NEW YORK, Sept. 13—(AP)—St. Louis Cardinals came within a hot breath of sweeping a doubleheader from the poor Phils at Philadelphia today, but even though they had to be content with winning one out of two the Red Birds roared into exclusive possession of first place in the National League by a full game.

The Cards were over-anxious in the opening tussle and gave the Phils two runs in the ninth inning to lose 2-1, but they came back like champions in the second game and won 3-2, to profit by Brooklyn Dodgers' double loss against Cincinnati Reds.

The stress of the exciting pennant struggle made everyone in Shibe Park tense—and there were a lot of people in the stands. The big show brought out a crowd of 20,789, coming within a few hundred of being the largest turnout of the year for the Phils, and they cheered every time the scoreboard posted runs for Cincinnati at Brooklyn.

### Reds Whip Dodgers Twice

At Brooklyn, while 31,463 fans died slowly in their seats, the Dodgers dropped both games of a doubleheader to Cincinnati Reds 6-3 and 4-1.

Only once during the afternoon did the Brooklyn rooters have a chance to cheer. Their moment came during the seventh inning of the opener, when the news was posted on the scoreboard that St. Louis had lost its first game with the Phils. There was nothing to alleviate their suffering during the nightcap. First Bucky Walters and then Ray Starr, two righthanders, poured it on the once-laughy Dodgers. Walters allowed them six hits in the opener and fairly coasted to victory

## Yanks climb Within one Game of pennant

NEW YORK, Sept. 13—(AP)—New York Yankees climbed within one game of the American League pennant today by sweeping a doubleheader from Cleveland Indians at Cleveland.

The Yanks swept rookie Ray Poole and his ineffective successor, Al Minter, for 14 hits to grab the first contest 9-1 and Hank Borowy outpitched Chubby Dean in the nightcap to win 4-1. It was the Yanks' fifth straight loss.

Borowy sparked New York's attack in the third inning of the nightcap when he singled to score Gerard Priddy, and Buddy Rosar, who had counseled home Joe Gordon for the first tally.

In the first contest the Yankees scored four runs in the third inning and the Braves split their performance next inning off Minter.

### Browns Whip A's Twice

At St. Louis, gilt-edged pitching and fortunately bunched hitting supported the Browns as they whipped Philadelphia Athletics 6-2 in the nightcap of a doubleheader after coasting to a 7-0 verdict in the opener.

Elden Auker, veteran right-hander, allowed but three hits in the opener as he blanked the Athletics for his 14th decision of the campaign. Chet Laabs plastered his 25th home run in the sixth inning.

### Red Sox Clip Chisox

At Chicago, Boston Red Sox beat Chicago White Sox 6-1 and 5-0 in a doubleheader.

### Tigers Split With Nats

At Detroit, rookie Hal White aided Detroit to a 2-0 victory over Washington Senators in the second game of a twin bill after the Tigers had kicked away the opener, 5-2, by donating the Senators three runs in the ninth.

Saturday New York Yankees set back Chicago White Sox 7-1. The Yanks, aided by the smart hurling of Spud Chandler who chalked up his 16th victory of the year, staged a five-run rally in the fifth to salt the game away.

Boston Red Sox also showed a sliver of power at Cleveland where they staged a four-run rally in the ninth inning to defeat the Indians 8-6. Detroit Tigers downed Philadelphia 6-5 in an 11-inning tussle when Don Ross' double and Barney McCosky's single accounted for a run.

In the only other league game, Washington Senators edged out St. Louis Browns 7-6 in 12 innings.

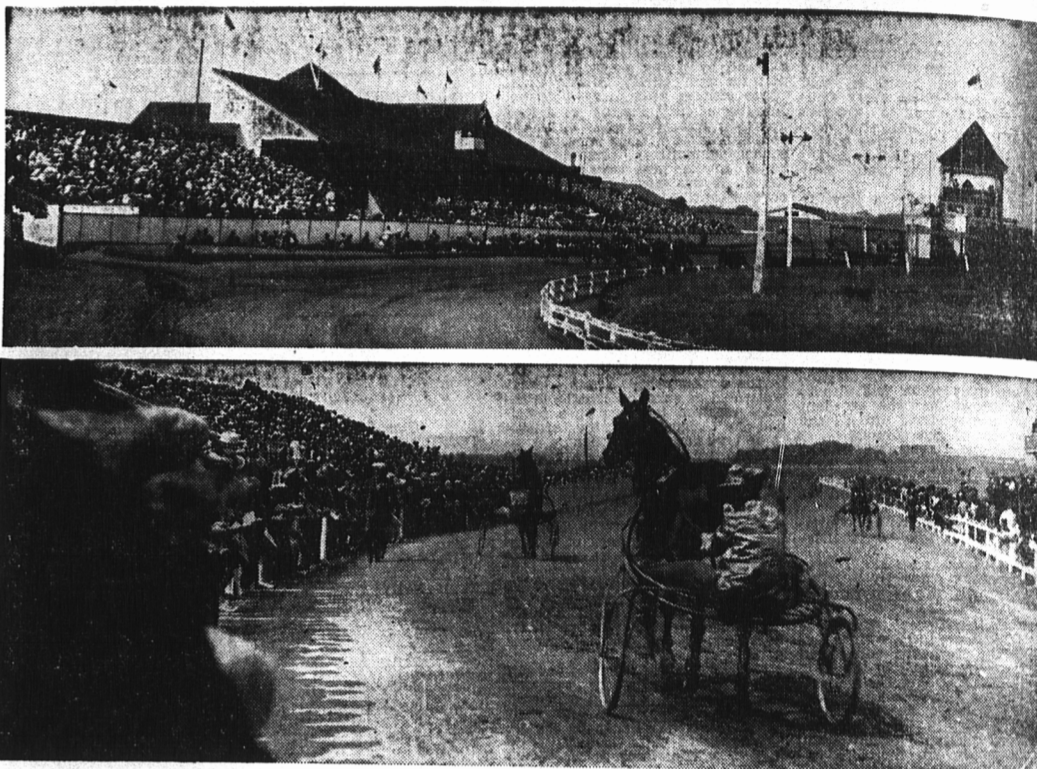
