GERMANS ARE INVITED FOR CONFERENCE

(British United Press)
PARIS, April 6.—Surprise was expressed at the Foreign Office today at the invitation of the British Government to Chancellor Heinrich Brüning and Dr. Julius Curtius, German Foreign Minister, to go to London for a conference.

A report from London said that the British hoped that Aristide Briand, Foreign Minister, also would attend. The Foreign Office described the report as "improbable" and declared that Briand had no intention of proceeding to London.

It was presumed here that any Anglo-German conversations would deal with preparations for the world arms parity to be held in February of next year. However, the British move came as a complete surprise, French officials intimated, and one not entirely pleasing to them.

The word of this British move came on the heels of Britain's cold reception of a proposal by Briand for a compromise on the French naval replacement building program outside the London Treaty, up to 1936.

The French are inclined to blame F. L. Craigie, British naval expert, who instituted the original conversations resulting in the Paris agreement between France and Italy, signed with the British as mediator.

BERLIN, April 6.—The increase in 1929 of 2,500 more divorce cases than in 1928 was blamed by officials here on the collapse of war marriages.
