THE Victoria hotel, recently opened in Sydney, Cape Breton, by Geo. Green of Alberton, P. E. I., who for some years has been keeping the Revere house there is next to the Sydney, the best hotel in the town. It is three stories, of the size 75x33, having 41 rooms, heated throughout with hot water and with electric lighting. The rooms are well furnished and comfortably fitted. THE following is the excellent report for 1900 of the Morell Dairying Company which shows 761,827 pounds of milk to have been received from May 29th to November 2nd from 120 patrons. This contained 43,984.5 pounds of butter fat. The average of butter fat was 3.77 per cent. The amount of cheese made was 72,135 1/2 pounds, an average of 10.66 pounds of milk for one pound. The average net price of cheese was 10.09 cents. During the season \$3,797.53 were divided among the patrons.

H. PRICE Webber, the general manager of the Boston Comedy Company for some time playing in New Brunswick, has had a streak of bad luck. His leading man suddenly died, then Mrs. Webber's father died, necessitating her going back to the States, and as a finish, the board of health, owing to the prevalence of smallpox in New Brunswick, refused to allow any performances. Mr. Webber's company was working towards Cape Breton, and it is likely these reverse will upset his arrangements.—Halifax Herald

THE Halifax Herald says:—At this season last year there were laid up in Halifax harbor twelve or fifteen Prince Edward Island vessels with cargoes of potatoes. At present there are not more than three or four. This means that next spring there will be a shortage of Island stock and that later on prices may be higher than usual till navigation opens. Another rather remarkable fact is that there are no really first-class apples in this market today. There may be plenty in the hands of the farmers in the country but Halifax, in the meantime, is barren of the best fruit. Prices range all the way from \$1.50 to \$1.00 per barrel. The scarcity of Nova Scotia dairy butter is still marked. There is practically none to be had. The only dairy butter on sale is imported from Ontario and Quebec. The stocks of cheese are rather large. Eggs continue at 20c. and 21c., the chief supplies coming from Prince Edward Island.
