Mr. LaPointe And Coming Conference

OTTAWA, Mar. 3.—"Those who pretend to rule this country" dramatically exclaimed Ernest Lapointe, in the House yesterday afternoon "have no right to represent it at the Imperial Conference and we shall not consider ourselves bound, either legally or morally, by any decisions arrived at there." Mr Lapointe is leader of the French speaking Liberals from Quebec and represents the division of Quebec East which Sir Wilfrid Laurier represented for so long. He was speaking at the time of the Conference of overseas premiers called in London for next June, and his declaration followed an argument of government's right to remain in office.

The Opposition, he added, would not be represented at the Conference. Cheered by the Liberals again Mr. Lapointe quoted a formidable array of British constitutional authorities to support the Opposition demand for the dissolution of Parliament.

I have not a drop of Anglo-Saxon blood in my veins but I want to see British principles and Government prevailing in Canada."

In opening the debate Mr Copp of Westmorland said the people of Canada were not satisfied with the present administration and should have an opportunity of pronouncing upon it. Mr Copp said he had interviewed a large number of electors during recess who unanimously gave their view that there must be a general election to clear up "this conglomeration" who now are occupying seats in Parliament. Whenever there was a chance in the policy of the Government or personell of the Cabinet they should be consulted.

Baseball Trial On March 14

CHICAGO, March 2.—The eight indicted members of the Chicago White Sox, charged with throwing the world's series games of 1919 to Cincinnati, will be tried on charges of conspiracy of obtaining money under false pretences, and operating a confidence game, it was revealed today by George E. Gorman, assistant state's attorney who filled a bill of particulars before Judge William E. Devere.
