**NEWFOUNDLAND JOINS
GOOD ROADS ASSOCIATION**

TORONTO, Ont., Aug 13—On the
invitation of the President and Ex-
ecutive Committee, the Government
of Newfoundland has become a
member of the Canadian Good
Roads Association on the same basis
as each of the Provinces of Canada.

The invitation was conveyed per-
sonally to the Hon. W. R. Hibbs,
Minister of Public Works, by Mess-
rs S. L. Squire and William Findlay,
Executive Committee Members, who
visited the ancient Colony for the
purpose.

The annual convention of the As-
sociation at Quebec in September
will be attended by Hon. Mr. Hibbs
and other members of the Govern-
ment. Sir Richard Squires will be
prevented by his trip to England to
the Imperial Conference, from at-
tending the Convention.

The two members of the Executive
Committee were given every oppor-
tunity to inspect the good roads sys-
tem of Newfoundland. It consists
of 750 miles of macadam and in-
cludes over 100 concrete bridges.
Hard surfaces are being extended
from St. John's on the principle
highways. The Canadian visitors
were surprised at the excellence of
the roads and economy with which
they have been built.

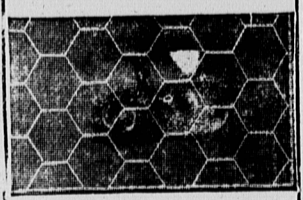
