The latest news, first of all. -William Baker and Charles McFarlane of Summerside are reported ill. -The following are the Alberton market prices: Pork per lb 8c, white and black oats per bus 45c, butter per lb 17c, hay per ton \$9, wild rice per pair 75c to \$1.00, eggs per doz. 15c. -Ralph and Mrs. Fielding of O'Leary, will have the sympathy of many friends in the death of their infant child which occurred Thursday. The interment will take place today in Presbyterian Cemetery at Alberton. -One of the most highly esteemed residents of St. Eleanor's passed away on Wednesday last, when George Gay, aged 87 years died. He leaves to mourn a widow and two daughters. The funeral took place yesterday afternoon to the Episcopal cemetery, St. Eleanor's, Rev. F. M. Weuster conducting the services. -The police have been working quietly on the theft of the poultry from the Clifton House, Summerside which took place on Sunday last. They have already arrested a boy, and yesterday they had summons issued for eight others who they think can throw some light on the matter, and some startling developments are expected at the boy's hearing which takes place before Stipendiary McQuarrie this morning. -Dealers in Summerside, yesterday were paying from fifteen to seventeen cents per lb for turkey and eight per dozen for eggs, eight dollars per ton for loose hay, four dollars and fifty cents for straw, forty-seven cents for white oats and fifty for black, eight to eight and five eighths cents for pork, ten cents per pound for geese, chickens and ducks, fifteen cents per lb for turkey and eight cents per lb for fowl. -The Rev. G. R. Stratlie, Summerside, delivered a highly interesting and instructive lecture, in the Presbyterian hall, on Thursday evening last to a crowded house, his subject was Edinburgh and around it, illustrated by stereopticon views. During the intermission Rev. H. R. Bell, sang several scotch songs, giving them an excellent rendition. At the close of the lecture, a hearty vote of thanks moved by John Mollison and seconded by R. H. McDonald was tendered the Rev. and gentlemen for the excellent entertainment provided.

MRS. GRAY WINS IN THE INSURANCE SUIT. TORONTO, April 1.-Mrs. Honro Maud Gray collects the \$15,000 insurance on the life of her husband, the late Victor Gerrish Gray, a Montreal stock broker. The jury in the assizes yesterday afternoon found that he did not commit suicide, as the Crown Life Insurance company alleged, and Mr. Justice Magee immediately gave judgment for the \$15,000. This judgment includes the interest on the amount from September 19th last, the date the claim papers were filed. Mrs. Gray was in court with her friend Mrs. D. L. McCarthy, when the jury returned. Her face beamed when they announced they had taken her view, that her husband did not commit suicide. When his lordship gave effect to their decision she quickly left the court room.

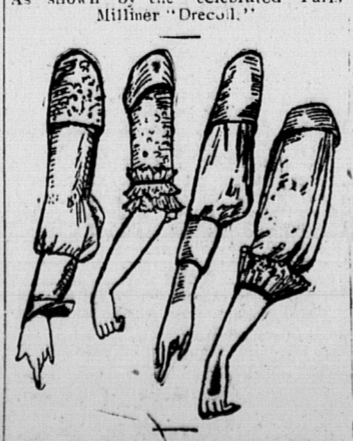

For the past few days Mr. Lotton, of St. John, N. B., has been securing horses for the St. John market. He has been successful in securing eleven each of which weighs over 1,200 lbs. Five of these beauties he secured from William W. Brown, of the Florida Hotel, Water Street. PRAYS IN DEATH CHAIR. ALBURN, N. Y., April 1.-Praying for her soul, Mrs. Mary Farmer was led to the electric chair in Alburn prison shortly after 6 a. m. today, and executed for the killing of Mrs. Sarah Brennan at Brownville last April. The execution of Mrs. Farmer - the second infliction of the death penalty on a woman by electricity in this state - was effected without sensational incident. Three contracts were given, and the physicians officially pronounced the woman dead at 6.15. Five women two prison attendants, were witnesses. Fr. Hickey, spiritual adviser of the condemned woman, followed the execution, gave out a statement signed by Mrs. Farmer, in which she declared that her husband, James Farmer, knew nothing of the crime until after it had been committed. Led by Fr. Hickey and with Mrs. Dunnigan and Miss Gorman, the two women attendants who have been with her constantly since she was brought to Alburn prison, Mrs. Farmer walked unflinchingly to the death chair. Her eyes were half closed and she saw nothing of the chair and rows of witnesses. In her hands she clasped a crucifix and as she was being strapped to the chair Fr. Hickey stood at her side and offered prayers for the dying. Dr. John Gevin, the prisoner physician, said that the woman was dead after the first shock, but as there was still a tremor of muscular reaction two succeeding shocks were given. State Electrician Davis said that 1840 volts and 7 1/2 amperes was the strength of the current. After the physicians had pronounced Mrs. Farmer dead Dr. Edward Spitzka of Philadelphia and Dr. Charles Lambert of the Pathological Institute at Wards Island, performed the autopsy. The statement which Mrs. Farmer prepared before she was taken to the condemned row was written by herself and addressed to Fr. Hickey, who told her that if she could truthfully exonerate her husband she should do so. All night long the wretched woman had prayed in her cell. In the next room was the instrument of death but she was not told that was all within its shadow. Earlier in the night, Mrs. Farmer had been brought from her cell on the second floor of the woman's department to the condemned row where she had farewell to her husband.
