

Black Hawks Handed 2-1 Defeat By Boston Bruins; Amerks And Wings Draw

CHICAGO, Jan. 5.—(CP)—Chicago Black Hawks' newest managing shuffle failed to provide the Stanley Cup champions with a winning formula tonight as they slipped deeper into their slump by taking a 2-1 defeat from the leading Boston Bruins.

A crowd of 10,000 watched the game, the Chicago team's first appearance since co-coaches Paul Thompson and Carl Vosz succeeded in winning as pilot of the outfit.

It was Boston's third straight victory over the world champion Hawks this season, but tonight's game marked the first time the Chicagoans have scored on goalie Francis Brimsek, sensational Boston rookie.

Woody Dumart hit the net at 13:58, assisted by Bobby Bauer, the Bruins held to the edge with brilliant defensive work until the third period.

Which won less than seven minutes to play, Joffre Deslats fired a goal to tie the score. He was assisted by Thompson and Jack Hill. The Bruins scored the winning tally at 18:49, Mel Hill getting the score unassisted.

(C. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) MONTREAL, Jan. 5.—Unbeaten in three starts since the first of the year, the last place Montreal Canadiens tonight held New York Rangers to a 2-2 overtime draw in a National Hockey League contest before about 6,000 fans.

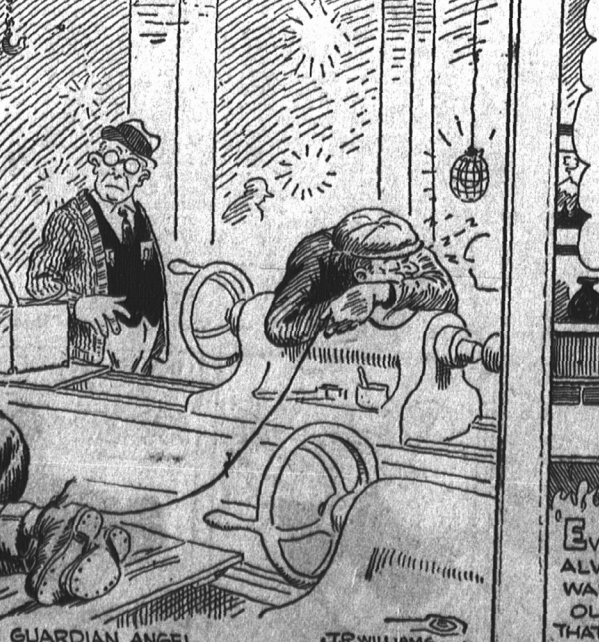
