Disney To Film American Legend

HOLLYWOOD, Oct. 6 (AP)—Walt Disney is going to make "Hiawatha."
This isn't the first time Disney has scanned the past for cartoon-movie material. He revived Uncle Remus in "Song of the South," Pecos Bill and Johnny Appleseed in "Melody Time." Now in process are "Little People," based on ancient Inprechaun legends, and "Alice in Wonderland."
Disney went to Erie to authenticate "Little People." Backgrounds of "Saludos Amigos" represented places visited by his artists in Latin America. He says research for "Hiawatha" will follow the same lengthy course.
Dick Kelsey, one of Disney's chief staff artists, will spend six weeks touring the Great Lakes region, sketching and documenting the settings of Longfellow's famous narrative poem.
Color camera records will supplement his sketches. The finished cartoon also will be in color.
Kelsey will be no easy task in this modern era, since he insists he will try to recapture both the spirit and the look of Hiawatha's land. Every remaining forest, prairie, lake and river associated with the Indian legend will be visited by boat, automobile, train, horse or on foot, he said.
When he returns to Hollywood, Kelsey's sketches and photographs will be given to background and animation artists. Disney himself will determine the settings to be emphasized in the story.
Kelsey works directly with the producer in these initial exploratory phases of Disney's important cartoon films. Basic ideas are elaborated through rough sketches in almost daily conferences until the fundamental pattern and treatment evolve.
Already the walls of Disney workrooms are bright with preliminary color drawings—rough sketches of the Chippewa hero; his trying place with the gentle Sioux maiden, Minnehaha, at the Singing Falls; and the tests he underwent in battling evil, pestilence and injustice among the tribes of the Iroquois council.

PUPILS THUMB NOSE AT COST OF LIVING
VANCOUVER, Oct. 6 (CP)—Prince George students are getting a break from high living costs. A model school dormitory for outside students provides board and room for only \$25 monthly. British Columbia School Trustees in annual convention here were given details of the dormitory—only one of its kind in the province.
Last year 38 pupils from all parts of northern British Columbia stayed in the dormitory, and this year there will be 50.
Trustee G. E. Styles of Prince George, said an H-shaped, army office's mess building had been converted into the dormitory. Original cost of the building was \$35,000. Moving and remodeling cost \$17,000.
Actual cost of housing a student is \$33 a month, but the school board pays \$4 a pupil and an ad-

ditional \$4 is paid by the Department of Education.
