Egg Production Is Holding Steady

Egg production is holding steady in Prince Edward Island and reported receipts were approximately the same as previous week, reports Mr. F. M. Nash, supervising poultry products inspector. In general, quality is good and all available supplies are moving freely to Maritime and Newfoundland points. The odd shipment is being moved to Montreal at a reported price of 57 cents per dozen basis A Large, Express charges being a cent a dozen; the transaction netting shipper 53 cents.

Although prices appear to have strengthened throughout the Maritimes, there has been no increase in paying prices for eggs in P. E. I. However, there does appear to be a considerable variation in price being paid producers for ungraded eggs by grading station operators here.

Producers are receiving for ungraded eggs AL 44-48; AM 42-43; B 34-35. Dealers are quoting for the graded pack in new cases AL 51, some sales made at 53. A Medium 49, B 39. Wholesalers are quoting retailers for the graded cartoned pack AL 54, AM 52, B loose 44, and these in turn are sold to consumers AL 64-65, B loose 53-58.

There appears to be no change in the poultry market and dealers continue to quote for dressed poultry over 5 lbs. basis rail grading. Chicken Special Milkfed 15, Milled 4, B 40, Fowl A 33, B 31. There is no market for tuft fowl and undeveloped chicken and by keeping these birds at home until ready for market producers will save themselves disappointment as to grade and prices.

Present prevailing prices on the local market do not encourage the sale of poultry to U.S.A. As the most American market was a means of securing for the producer a price for his product in line with the value of same.

Increasing Use Made Of Railway Sidings In P.E.I.

An increasingly important factor in handling railway freight on the Island is the increasing use made by business concerns of industrial sidings. The 12 issued April 30, 1938, the following are taken, as compared to those of 1948:

Discontent In Russia's European Empire

ject countries are on the verge of open rebellion. It is a long way from discontent to rebellion under any adequately ruthless dictatorship. And the Communist "cadres" are still, on the whole, both loyal and in command of the situation.

But the "Empire" is uneasy and must be held in subjection by all the apparatus of despotism. The Russians have created a troublesome situation for themselves by their own folly. They have been arrogant and overbearing where they should have been tactful. They have everywhere affronted national feeling, they have behaved like a "herrenvolk." They have insisted on public recognition of the superior wisdom of the Soviet Communist Party, on admiration for the unique process of the Soviet Army. They have demanded personal reverence and adulation for Stalin. They have required not only tacit obedience but open submission. And they are paying the price for their superiority complex.

Their "Empire in Europe" is not on the verge of open revolt. The apparatus of repression is far too strong for anything of the kind. But it is moving towards a state of mental rebellion, of passive disloyalty. Stalin's avowed aim has been that the East European States should be "loyal" to the Soviet Union. His achievement is that, more and more, they are becoming obedient but disloyal. That is the real significance of the Gomulka affair.
