AT ROTARY

At the weekly Rotary Luncheon yesterday, the speaker was Judge W. S. Stewart, whose subject was "The Eccentricities and Peculiarities of the 18th Century British Judges." He related some stories of several judges of the High Court of Edinburgh, namely, Lord Braxfield, Lord Eggleston, Lord Gardenstone, Lord Hamilton and Lord Thurlow of London. These men lived one hundred and fifty years ago, when there were many trials for sedition and treason after the suppression of the Stuart rebellion in 1745. They were on the whole men of considerable ability, but with personal eccentricities, causing amusement at times.

One of them was described "as one of the last of the great drinkers." He regarded the worship of Bacchus as a real duty. In one case he and other judges were called upon to try a prisoner who had stabbed another during a drinking carousal. The other judges were disposed to look upon the offence more of a legal than a moral one, and to regard it as homicide. But Hermand was more severe, and wanted the prisoner transported on the ground that he murdered the man whom he had been drinking with. If he had committed this murder when he was drunk, said His Lordship what would he have done if he were sober?

Another judge used to console the victims which he sentenced to death with the following words:—"I do not know what your religious persuasion is, but I know that there will be plenty of clergymen who will be most happy to show you the way to eternal life."

Judge Stewart also told an anecdote of more recent years, of a judge who was addressing the Canadian Club in Western Canada on "Criminal Law, the Quasi Criminal Law, such as the Saskatchewan Liquor Act, and Civil Law." The next day the papers reported that he gave a splendid address on "Civil Law, the 'Crazy Criminal Law, such as the Saskatchewan Liquor Act, and Civil Law."

Langford recently appealed to the National Sports Alliance, which has a fund for the aid of needy boxers and their families. He asked for \$500, with which to open a bootblack stand in Boston, where he feels he can build up sufficient patronage to keep him for the remainder of his life.

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
